A Lenten Season for Giving



As we are invited this year to the observance of a holy Lent, it is unfortunate that this penitential season has become associated with gloom and deprivation, conjuring up images of sackcloth and ashes, lugubrious music, and pseudo-pious abstentions from "life's necessities," i.e. ice cream, chocolate, whisky, etc. Thus, our focus is misdirected and affixed

on our poor, put-upon selves, while our Lord's ordeal in the wilderness is diminished and trivialized.

Why not consider that Lent is a time to celebrate the risen Christ -and not ourselves- who is our Beginning and our End. Can we rejoice that the Gospel of Jesus Christ is not about us, but rather the God who loved us first? Is there comfort in knowing that the Great Commission is not dependent our faithfulness and resources, but on the abundant, saving grace of God?

Lent is not about what we can give up; but rather what we can give to others. Our focus in Lent is not on ourselves, but on those we are privileged to serve. As Peter Chysologus, Bishop of Ravenna, wrote in 450 A. D.: "When you fast, see the fasting of others. If you want God to know that you are hungry, know that another is hungry. If you hope for mercy, show mercy. If you look for kindness, show kindness. If you want to receive forgiveness, forgive others. If you ask for yourself what you deny to others, your asking is a mockery. When you fast, if your mercy is thin your harvest will be thin; when you fast, what you pour out in mercy overflows into your barn. Therefore, do not lose by saving, but gather in by scattering. Give to the poor, and give to yourself. You will not be allowed to keep what you have refused to give to others."

May the Holy Spirit, who leads us into all truth, speak to us words of pardon and peace.

The Village Chapel Music Series: Lenten Concert March 12, 5:00pm



On Sunday, March 12, our concert series continues with a special Lenten concert. The central work on the program is a setting of the *Stabat Mater* text by Italian composer Giovanni Battista Pergolesi. *Stabat Mater* is a 13th century Latin hymn that depicts Jesus Christ suffering on the cross from his mother's perspective. It is one of the most agonizing hymn texts ever written.

Pergolesi's setting of the piece is scored for soprano and alto duet and string orchestra. Dr. Laurissa Backlin will sing soprano on this performance, with Shanon Venable singing alto. Dr. Backlin is Assistant Professor of Music at Delta State University. She holds degrees from the University of North Texas (Doctor of Musical Arts), Temple University (MM), and Wheaton College (Bachelor's). Ms. Venable serves The Village Chapel as a choir section leader and is a cornerstone of the Moore County musical community, in frequent demand as a soloist and teacher. They will be accompanied by a string quintet and organ continuo.

The *Stabat Mater* will be paired with J.S. Bach's towering masterwork, the *Passaglia in C Minor* for organ.

The Raleigh Ringers in concert



On Saturday, April 8 at 7:00pm, The Village Chapel of Pinehurst will host The Raleigh Ringers, an internationally acclaimed handbell ensemble. Since its founding in 1990, The Raleigh Ringers has been dazzling concert audiences with unique interpretations of sacred, secular and popular music, including famous rock 'n' roll tunes arranged just for handbells.

Under the direction of David M. Harris, The Raleigh Ringers has released six CDs, and two DVDs of holiday concerts titled *One Winter Evening at Meymandi* and *A December Tradition*. The first concert was broadcast on more than 250 public television stations in 44 states. The second one has been broadcast in 37 states on over 80 public television stations. The group has performed in 39 states, the District of Columbia, Canada, England and France during its tours, and plays two dates each year at a major venue in Raleigh.

The Raleigh Ringers use the most extensive collection of handbells and bell-like instruments owned by a single performing group in the world. Currently the group uses 29 ½ octaves across 361 pieces of equipment, including seven different sets of handbells.

Tickets are \$18 for adults \$10 for children aged 12 years and under. While tickets will be available at the door, everyone is encouraged to order tickets ahead of time. The Chapel Shepherd Ministry: Frequently Asked Questions



Support efforts may include cards, meals, visits, transportation, etc. Since John, Betsy and Ashley will always be included as recipients of the communication, this will allow them to collaborate with the flock when needed. **C.** You will also hear from your flock leader when a chapel visitor or new member lives in your neighborhood. Again, please respond with reply all, if you are willing to reach with a card, phone call or personal visit.

Q: When should I contact my flock leader? You may hear of a neighbor in need before your flock leader or our Pastoral staff knows. Please call or email your flock leader with the news you have. Together you can decide who will reach out to the individual or family to determine their needs. Also inform your flock leader of a chapel visit or new member so they can receive a warm welcome.

The Village Chapel Annual Meeting 2017 Music Ministry Report

Our music ministry remains a vital component of not only this church, but the musical climate of Moore County as well. Our Chapel Choir, Hanchime Choir, and Children's Choir have all played a role in representing The Village Chapel in the community. This report will document the many activities and progress our music program has made in the last 12-18 months, and will outline upcoming projects.

The Chapel Choir continues to effectively lead our 9:30am and 11:00am worship services through hymns and anthems every week. We are blessed to have a steady group of 25 active singers, plus a handful of seasonal singers. Besides singing for approximately 84 Sunday services per year, the choir also assists in leading worship for Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, the Easter Sunrise Service at the Carolina Hotel, and the 9:00pm Christmas Eve worship service. In December 2015, the Chapel Choir and Children's Choir presented a Christmas concert with brass and timpani to a packed audience. Also of note is the September 11th Service of Remembrance, held in our sanctuary this past September, as our Chapel Choir combined with the Parish Choir of Emmanuel Episcopal Church (Southern Pines). An anthem was commissioned specifically for this service by Durham-based composer Brian Schmidt. This was an especially important event for the community to experience as we commemorated the lives of those who perished in the September 11 terror attacks. This past December, we offered a special worship service, joined by the Carolina Brass, to present festival hymns and anthems of the Christmas season. We look forward to welcoming them back to our sanctuary in years to come.

The Children's choir continues to be ably-led by Deb Holden (whose wedding we celebrated this past October). Under her leadership, the children have enjoyed a fun and exuberant atmosphere, presenting musical offerings in worship once per month and learning about the various seasons of the church year. They also assist in leading music for our Hanging of the Greens service at the beginning of each Advent. In addition to other Sunday worship services, the children will present musical offerings on both Palm

Sunday and Easter. Their final Sunday in worship for the spring, as is tradition, will be Mother's Day. In what has become an important outreach, the children have sung for the residents of Quail Haven the past two years, and it is our goal to continue that outreach at other assisted living facilities. We are so very thankful for Deb's continued leadership with our children and look forward to her continuing with us.

Our Handchime Choir remains a crucial arm of the music ministry. We rehearse once weekly, preparing music for worship services. Reigniting a past outreach project, our Handchime Choir presented a 20 minute program of Christmas music this past December for the residents of Quail Haven and Penick Village. What a treat it was to bring some Christmas joy to folks who might not have received it otherwise. In yet another important outreach project, our annual Christmas Caroling was a smash hit yet again this year. With exceptional leadership from Darlene Skinner, George Trail, Jeanne Anderson, and Jane Jackson, many of our homebound members were treated to lively choruses of Christmas carols by members of our Chapel community. I must express my gratitude to all those who participated in this outreach – our homebound members are also especially grateful for your attendance and participation.

I must express my gratitude to the many individuals who routinely come together to make wonderful music for the sole purpose of glorifying God, and also to the pastors, staff, and members of this church for your gracious support of The Chapel music program.



Monsignor Stephen C. Worsley— priest, medical doctor, and author- will speak on “Ecumenism in the 21st Century: A Priest’s Perspective,” at The Village Chapel March 8, at 6:30 p.m., following a dinner served at 5:45 p.m., in Chapel Hall.

As long time director of Mission Outreach at St. Joseph of the Pines, and a long-time member of Saint Joseph’s Board of Trustees, Monsignor Worsley has supported the development of Belle Meade, Providence Place facilities in Aberdeen, Robbins and Carthage, as well as the LIFE Center in Fayetteville. He was appointed to his position as Director Of Mission Outreach by Bishop Michael Burbidge in May of 2015.

Monsignor Worsley previously served as a pastor and administrator in the Diocese of Raleigh and as Vice President of St. Joseph Hospital in New Hampshire. With publications in church history, art history and bio-ethics, he has lectured in Asia, Africa, Europe and North America. In addition to numerous boards and ethics committees, he has served on the Theological/Ethical Advisory Committee of the Catholic Health Association.

Monsignor Worsley earned degrees in chemistry, medicine, divinity and moral theology at the Universities of North Carolina, Duke, Notre Dame and the Accademia Alfonsiana in Rome.
