It has been said...our worst days are never so bad that we are beyond the reach of God's Grace. And our best days are never so good that we are beyond the need of God's Grace.

John Newton—the famous hymn writer—once said:

I am not what I ought to be. I am not what I want to be. I am not what I hope to be. But still, I am not what I used to be. And by the grace of God, I am what I am.

Marriage has a way of humbling us; I have had to "eat crow" so many times in my life. I remember years ago, Vickie and I went to visit my parents who were about three hours away at the time. After being there all day and into the evening we left at dark. About an hour into our drive back home, her cell phone rang. It was my mother telling Vickie that she left her pocketbook!

We had to turn around and drive back, with my parents having to meet us half-

About a month later, we went to visit my parents again. This time we stayed the night and left early the next morning. On the way home, about an hour into our drive my cell phone rang. It was my dad... telling me I had left my wallet and my watch in the guest room. I couldn't believe it!

I had to tell my wife that we had to turn around because I had left my wallet and my watch! Vickie laughed and said, "It's okay, it happens to all of us." I was so embarrassed and ashamed of how I acted.

I learned a valuable lesson that day: We are at our best when we are overlooking the faults of others, realizing that they too are overlooking ours.

As Christians, Christ desires us to live with an attitude of Grace, living each day fully aware of the ongoing need of His Grace.

Thomas a' Kempis, an Augustinian monk who lived in the 15th century wrote a book entitled, "The Imitation of Christ". He is one of my favorite authors, and this book makes for a great devotional or small group study.

Speaking on the topic of avoiding rash judgments he says... "keep your eyes on

yourself and be careful that you don't judge the deeds of others. The effort of judging others is fruitless, and you'll often make mistakes and easily sin, but the effort of judging and examining yourself always bears fruit."



On the topic of "enduring the faults of others" he writes..."endeavor to be patient in enduring the failures and weaknesses of others, no matter what kind they are, for you yourself have many failings that must be endured by others...if you can't make yourself into the kind of person you want to be, how can you expect to influence someone else to be what you like them to be? We are eager to have others perfect, but yet we do not correct our own faults."

Hear it again...our worst days are never so bad that we are beyond the reach of God's Grace. And our best days are never so good that we are beyond the need of God's Grace.

"The Least of These"

"And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, In as much as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me." Matthew 25:40

In *Matthew 25* Jesus is describing the final judgement rendered by the King of Heaven. Jesus speaks of it in terms of separating the sheep from the goats, and it is fascinating the conditions that Jesus lays out for the judgement. Often in evangelical circles the conditions for the final

judgement are based around whether an individual has accepted or rejected Christ. In fact, if you grew up in the Bible Belt then there is a chance you have heard many sermons along those same lines. I want to make it clear that I am not demeaning or objecting to that view, but I do want to point out that here Jesus is putting forth a much different criteria for entering the Kingdom of Heaven.

The passage starts with the King telling the sheep (those who have been found worthy of the Kingdom) that when He was hungry, the sheep gave Him something to eat. When He was thirsty, they gave Him something to drink, when He was naked, they clothed Him, and when He was sick or imprisoned, they visited Him. This stuns the sheep because they certainly never saw the King in any of these situations! And that is where we arrive at vs. 40, as the King says when you did any of these things to the "least of these," then you did it to Him.

In the same manner, the goats (those found unworthy) are separated, except they are chastised for not helping the "least of these." This is a shocking revelation, as the goats would have helped the King had they found him in these situations, but they likewise never saw Him. This time the King says, "In as much as ye did it not to one of the least of these, ye did

it not to me." At times I wonder how the church has forgotten, or possibly ignored, the words of Christ found in Matthew 25. Perhaps some feel that it is easier to simply believe something, rather than do something.

As for myself, this passage speaks to how intimately faith and action are intertwined. It is impossible to tease the two apart, and with genuine faith comes genuine action. I will leave you with the words of Keith Green at the end of his song, The Sheep and the Goats, "In the end, the only difference between the sheep and the goats, is what they did, or did not, do."

J ane Jackson, a true Southern gal, was born and raised in Rock Hill, South Carolina.

Jane found her lifelong joy in music and performance starting at the age of 3, being asked by her mother to sing for her friends when they came to call. Throughout her youth she sang in school choirs, church choirs, and studied piano until she graduated from High School. During her college years at Winthrop College in Rock Hill, SC (her birthplace and home), she was active in the music department as a member of their female sextet, even as her major was in business education. After graduating and going to work in Charlotte, she joined the Charlotte Choral Society, became one of their soloists, and was even the first "angel" on the top of their newly erected steel Singing Christmas Tree from which they gave their annual Christmas concerts.

Jane met and married Bob Foster in 1959 while working in Charlotte, NC with the Associated General Contractors of the Carolinas. After marriage they moved several times as his career with General Electric as a marketing manager progressed and as he was climbing the corporate ladder. His last move with GE landed them in Fairfield, CT where he was at their Housewares headquarters in Bridgeport. Then in the 70's he was recruited by Crane Corporation to run their Plumbing division in NYC. Bob retired from Crane in the late 80's and they stayed there until they moved to Pinehurst in 1997. As a scratch golfer, he loved living in Pinehurst, but unfortunately, after a 40-year marriage, Bob died one year later from complications after abdominal surgery.

Bob had three children when he and Jane married: Scott Foster, of Auburn, N.Y., Ray Foster, of Sarasota, Fla., and Gail Toney, of Johnson City, TN. Bob and Jane also raised

three girls of their own; Laura (Landerman) lives in Naples, Florida and has a home in Cape Cod, Massachusetts; Robin (Brownlow) from Wilmington, NC and Ruthie (Branch) who lives in Portland, Oregon. Jane has 4 grandchildren, one great grandchild, and 4 step-grandchildren.

In 2003, Jane was introduced to Charlie Jackson by a neighbor who knew him from the First Health Fitness Center. Charlie was a career senior officer with the CIA before retiring to Pinehurst with his former wife, since deceased, some years earlier. After a rich and happy courtship, they married in 2007 and Charlie moved from his home in Pinewild to McKenzie Road and lived with Jane in her Pinehurst home until his death in 2017. He became a member of the Village Chapel and attended the 11:00 o'clock service regularly. He served on the committee to hire Ashley Smith and enjoyed his time and friendships made at the Chapel.

Jane shared her many experiences related to her musical endeavors. She sang in the Atlanta Choral Society, the Boston Choral Society, and in the Fairfield County Choral in Connecticut where over a span of some twenty or so years she was their president not once, but twice. It was here that she developed her love of singing classical masterworks as a chorister and participating in choral concerts with professional directors, soloists and orchestras. She also sang in NYC with the Amor Artists ensemble under the direction of Johannes Sommary. During her time with the Chorale, she produced and directed a musical fundraising revue, using their talented voices, to raise money for their classical concerts.

Also in Fairfield, she was soloist at St. Timothy's Episcopal Church, where she put together a musical revue to raise money to buy a grand piano for their sanctuary. She also taught Sunday School, began reading at services and served as a vestry member for a while. In the secular world, as a member of the Jr. League, she joined their music therapy group performing for nursing facilities and about town. After a decade of volunteering, 12 members of the group formed a performing ensemble they called "A Touch of Class", and under her leadership, entertained for clubs and other events, notable among them singing at the White House for their annual Easter Egg Hunt twice and at the Statue of Liberty ceremony as they removed Miss Liberty's torch for restoration. During that same time, after landing a role as Mary Sunshine in a community theater production of the Broadway musical, Chicago", Jane and 7 other cast members formed a performing group called "Stage Works" and entertained locally throughout Fairfield County for about 9 years.

During that same time frame Jane was hired to run the offices of an organization that sponsored and assisted young classical musicians to further their professional careers -Performers of Connecticut, with headquarters in Westport, CT. Her responsibilities *(Continued on pg. 4)*

(Jane Jackson- continued from pg. 3) involved keeping their membership files and financial records, finding venues for them to perform, and writing advertising and programs for their advancement.

In Pinehurst she joined the Village Chapel choir under the direction of John Shannon and joined the Moore County Choral Society where she served as president for one term but stayed on for many years as a member of the chorus. When the Chapel celebrated their 75th Anniversary, she put together a musical revue as entertainment for the evening's event using choir members as performers. And upon the retirement of Chaplain Ed Galloway as Senior Pastor, she wrote, produced, and directed a highly successful musical revue for an evening celebration in his honor, again using the talents of choir members.

As word got out that her success at fundraising might benefit their organizations, Jane was asked and agreed to produce and direct several fundraising musical revues for them, mostly for Habitat for Humanity, doing at least three programs over the next few years and raising needed funds for their projects. Her favorite music achievement, however, was deciding to go out on her own as a onewoman show, accompanied by Darlene Skinner, performing for clubs, churches, and Chapel functions. Her repertoire consisted of songs from the American Songbook, standards, and Broadway. "Music has been my sustaining grace throughout the years and I've loved every note, the good and not so good. God has been good to me."

Music Notes

A very happy Easter to you all! We are fortunate to have been joined in worship by many talented guest musicians during the Lenten season and the first part of Easter, most of whom reside here in Moore County. I must also give thanks and praise to our Chapel Choir and Children's Choir for their efforts during this time as well. It has been a stunning few months of music-making.

As we enter the back end of our program year, I wanted to take this opportunity to highlight two major offerings that are upcoming-

On Sunday, April 28, we will bring our congregation together for a Music Celebration Service at 10:00AM. This became an annual occurrence in the years leading up to the pandemic and I am excited to reinstate it into our schedule. This will be a music-centric service, highlighted by selected movements from composer Leo Nestor's American Triptych, based on American folk hymns. Choral anthems and congregational hymns will be supported by selected scripture readings, sacred poetry, and theological writings.

Our Chapel Music Series will conclude on Friday, May 31 at 7:00PM in a concert featuring choral music from the British Isles. In this Celebration of British Choral Music, a

small professional choir made up of individuals from Moore County and the Triangle will present both accompanied and a cappella settings of texts taken from noted hymn composers, holy scripture, and the Book of Common Prayer. I'd like to preview three pieces from this concert.

We will open the program with Charles Wood's setting of the canticle Hail, Gladdening Light, an arrangement of a third century text for double choir. This piece, which features the two choirs singing back and forth to each other at times, is an evening hymn giving thanks to Christ as the light of the world. Later in the program, the choir will sing William Harris' ethereal Faire is the Heaven, another piece for double choir with words taken from Edmund Spenser's poem An Hymne of Heavenly Beautie. Harris' piece has remained a beloved staple for choirs in large part for its exceptional text painting using only voices with no accompaniment. This is one of two pieces on the program that depicts the kingdom of heaven in all its glory. Our concert will conclude with Herbert Howell's setting of the *Te Deum*, which is perhaps the most epic texts giving praise to God. The pieces opens with the proclamation, "We praise thee, O God, we acknowledge thee to be the Lord. All the earth doth worship him, the Father everlasting." This

piece, for voices and organ, is considered, at least by me, to represent the pinnacle of English church music.

Howells as a composer undoubtedly speaks with his own English accent and this work is one of the greatest examples of this. It is a slightly longer work (influenced entirely by the text) which features vast character shifts and asks a great deal of the organist and singer. Our chapel's Austin/Zimmer organ as well as our fabulous singers will be put through their paces and seen in all their glory in this magnificent program. I hope you will join us.

Our new accounting software has been installed and reports are being generated for the Board. Separate reports by committee will be generated also. Management of our resources is a critical part of Board activities and essential to living within our budget.

At our February Retreat, the Board decided to create a Long-Range Plan and Vice Chair Matt Utley will head that committee. We feel that we need to be constantly looking ahead at possible needs and opportunities as we grow.

Chapel Hall and Admin offices by internal groups as well as outside organizations continues to grow. Under the direction of Trustee Julie Huggins, we are updating our Facilities Use Policy and procedures for any outside group as well as weddings and funerals to ensure that appropriate documents are used and agreements are understood.

We are conducting our annual review of church Bylaws to see if any tweaking is needed. Any changes would need to be approved by the congregation.

The committees are all hard at work on their plans for the year and we look forward to seeing all they plan to accomplish come to fruition. A new summary of the list of committees and description of what they do by Pastor Trey is about ready and that may help new members and really all members identify areas where they would like to add their talents.

The internal team to define our needs for the Heritage Hall second floor has been meeting and will be communicating with our architect so technical drawings can be developed this year.

The staff continues to do a wonderful job in a highly professional and efficient manner. We are so blessed with everyone on the staff!

was held March 19-21st at the Billy Graham Training Center at the Cove in Asheville NC.



BEHOLD, HEAVEN AND THE HEAVEN OF HEAVENS CANNOT CONTAIN THEE; HOW MUCH LESS THIS HOUSE WHICH I HAVE BUILT. (II CHRONICLES 6:188 KJU)
