

Meet the Congregation

hroughout nearly 35 years of wedlock Jackie and Steve Woodward mastered the art of tagging along on business trips, which typically found Steve as the trailing spouse, aka, the tag-along.

One such trip arrived Memorial Day weekend, 1997, a quarter-century ago. From their home in the Chicago suburbs, Jackie headed to Charlotte for the Coca-Cola 600 NASCAR race in which McDonald's, her then-employer sponsored a car. Jackie was a member of the McDonald's corporate marketing division.

To flesh out the weekend, the Woodwards planned a stop near Greensboro to shop for furniture. There was a day in between. Where to go? Said a colleague, "Your husband is into golf, isn't he? You should visit Pinehurst." Thus, they took their first step down destiny's path. A short visit lingered in their memories when, in 1999, Steve was working for a marketing agency at The Masters golf tournament in Augusta, GA. He'd earned a few days off and decided to drive up to Pinehurst, where a realtor awaited to show him around. Meanwhile, Jackie was traveling on business in Europe.

A colleague of Jackie's said, "Your husband is into golf, isn't he? You should visit Pinehurst." Thus, they took their first step down destiny's path....

The cagy realtor accomplished two goals that April day. He opened Steve's eyes to the ripe golf rental marketing in Pinehurst, showing him how a second home could nearly pay for itself. His second goal was to close the sale. And he did. Meanwhile, the realtor stewed. He never had sold a house to one spouse (the guy) with the other (the gal) not having seen it. In the infancy of sending attachments by email, Steve managed to forward photos of the property to Jackie. She said, "Buy it."

The home on Linden Road was ready in 2000, just in time for a famous ice storm, and would host golfer Jim Furyk and family during the 2005 U.S. Open. The Nibblick Cottage, named in homage to a golf club variety of the pine-shafted era, would remain a rental favorite through the 2014 Open (and also was host to many Woodward family occasions). In 2014, the Lord's will saw to completion of a journey begun in 1997. The Nibblick was remodeled once more, from top to bottom, and completed in time for daughter Layne's O'Neal School graduation in May 2015. Steve pursued a foray into the restaurant business in Raleigh. Jackie commuted by air to Minneapolis, where she was a marketing executive with General Mills.

Somehow, with the passage of time, everyone came home. Steve escaped the restaurant business mostly unscathed. Jackie became chief marketing officer of Charlotte-based Bojangle's Chicken & Biscuits, a 770-unit chain. Layne graduated from Southern Methodist University in 2019 and, like Mom, commutes to Charlotte a few days a week to work for – of course – a sports marketing agency. When she is at home, Layne trains with her beloved hunterjumper horse, Leo, in Southern Pines, and competes in shows throughout the year.

The principal regret harbored today by Steve and Jackie is that they did not find their church home at The Village Chapel until 2020. But what a home they found.

From the Director of Music

In our lives, we are usually fortunate to experience at least one transformative or life-altering event, more if we are lucky. Transforming, inspirational, and unbelievable do not even begin to describe the week of July 11-17. As of this writing, I am several days removed from returning from my time at Duke University serving as Course Organist for the Royal School of Church Music in America (RSCMA) Carolina Course.

Between Monday and Sunday, our course participants made of girls ages 10-18 from all parts of the East coast along with our many adult singers enjoyed a week of worship, rehearsals, and fellowship. I had the blessing of serving as organist for the week, which meant I was responsible for accompanying all full rehearsals, evening services, and playing our closing services held in Duke Chapel on Sunday morning and afternoon.

The course was musically directed by Dr. Robert Poovey, Director of Music at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Rochester, New York. Dr. Poovey and I worked closely during the week and formed an incredible musical partnership that I will forever hold dear. There is a short period of time to prepare a great deal of



music and present it at an extremely high level and this only happens successfully with a strong leadership team. This team also included four housemasters that spent time rehearsing the participants in smaller groups so that when everyone came together, much of the learning had already been done. One of our talented housemasters was Dr. Homer Ferguson, my colleague at Emmanuel Episcopal Church in Southern Pines. The course is managed by my dear friend and colleague Matthew Brown, Director of Music at St. Luke's Episcopal, Atlanta. Matthew is one of the finest people I know, and it is through his generous invitation that I was able to live out this dream.

A special mention must be made of the inspiring spiritual leadership of the Rev. Erika Takacs, who served as our Chaplain during the week. Mother Erika offered relevant homilies at our services and her giving spirit and warm personality permeated our entire course. She also helped navigate an impromptu service project initiated by our girls who wished to help support the homeless population of Durham.

It takes a great deal of discipline and training to prepare so much music at such a high level and the work of our participants was nothing short of heroic. I was grateful to meet so many wonderful colleagues and experience the enthusiasm that these young people have for sacred music. Many of the girls that have come through the Carolina Course over its many years have gone on to major in music and have successful careers in music. The future for church music is very bright with this generation.

By the time we reached our closing services, the work had been done, and all that was left was for everyone to pour out their hearts and leave nothing behind. Our Sunday morning and afternoon services left me drained of all energy and floating on the highest cloud. Our week had come to an end, and the memories of week have filled my soul to the brim. May we all be so lucky to be this inspired in our lives.






Christina has been the Clinic's enrollment coordinator for almost 2 years. She reviews patient applications, income documentation and does annual updates. She is a valued member of the Clinic team. You would never know that several years ago, Christina was in a bad place. She had substance abuse issues and her life was spiraling out of control. She made the decision to change and sought help at Bethany House, a local residential recovery facility for women.

During the six month program, Christina became a patient of the Clinic to address some long neglected health issues. "I was not a

good patient initially, but a lot of time was spent to help me understand how to improve my health. I was treated with respect. I like to say the Clinic gave me a good foundation." Christina successfully completed the recovery program and began to serve as a board member of the non-profit facility. She worked for a while in retail, until she heard about the job opening at the Clinic.

"I felt that I could give back to the community by working at the Clinic. It helped me so much when I most needed it, and I really enjoy seeing when patients start on their own journeys of recovery. I love this job!"

The Women of the Chapel is one of the oldest standing committees formed to serve the Chapel in providing activities for women to gather for study, fellowship and service to our church and community. All women who attend the Chapel are welcome to participate in this steering committee that meets on the second Tuesday of each month at 9:30 am at the Care Cottage. (Traditionally the WOC committee does not meet in June and July, except for working subcommittees.) Cross Ties Luncheons are a way to have added fellowship time after each WOC meeting on the second Tuesday each month starting at 11:45 am year around. These luncheons are held at the Pine Crest. The special events planned by the WOC are open to all women including neighbors and friends as a way to reach out to the community with the Love of the Lord. Some of the most popular events for this purpose are the Spring Tea, Fall Retreat and Christmas Brunch. These events are held at a number of different venues and always include a time of food, fellowship and an inspirational message.

In accordance with our mission, we are committed to Bible Study, prayer as ways to draw closer in our personal relationship with the Lord. One other activity that also has become a tradition is our making of Chrismon's each year that adorn the Christmas Tree in the Chapel each Advent. Each of the Chrismon's are chosen as a symbol of Christ's life and character and are made to His glory. Most

Chrismon's are created with a bible verse as a reference for each symbol. Then we also make palm crosses from branches from Palm Sunday as a reminder of Christ's resurrection.

As a way to serve our community we support the Angel Tree Program each year and currently are also providing cozy fleece blankets to all of the children at the Boys and Girls Home of

Lake Waccama North Carolina. These children have been taken from at-risk homes to be placed in this safe haven. Blankets are being hand made each Friday from 2-5 pm at the church until the 40 blankets are completed and ready to be delivered in the Fall.

These are a few of the standing and a few of the newest activities of the Woman of the Chapel. However, we are always looking for new ideas and new members for the steering committee. We hope that the Chapel women will consider joining us for our meeting and certainly for all the events planned. We would love to see these activities be cross generational so we all can grow together as a community of believers.

Perhaps you didn't know The Village Chapel had a library...It is located in the rear of the Care Cottage in the conference room.




Books, videos, audio cassettes are available to be checked out via a simple process. Select the item you wish to borrow, sign the card in the back of the





Survey Results on Chapel Herald Readership

We want to thank everyone who participated in the survey. Your feedback will guide our efforts to provide interesting and informative articles about what is happening in the church. The survey was sent to 361 recipients, and we received 143 responses. The following is a general summary of those responses.

Question # 1 ("How often do you read The Herald?"): almost 75% of the respondents said they read the Herald more than ten times per year. Most receive it electronically via mobile device and lap/desktop computer. A lesser number of respondents (23/138) read hard copies, most of which are picked up at church, with a much smaller number receiving it via mail.

When asked which option of receiving the Herald they preferred, 91 out of 136 respondents said they preferred to continue reading it electronically, while 39 indicated they would like the electronic version with an option to request that a printed copy be mailed to them. Six respondents (out of 136 total respondents) would prefer that copies be mailed to all members.

A large majority of respondents (105 out of 133), said that the messages by the ministers ranked first, followed by Events (82/133) and Meet the Congregation articles (75/133). In declining order, Birthdays & Anniversaries, Outreach, Farewells, and Family & Youth activities followed.

There were many constructive comments that people shared. Some of the main ones are summarized below:

The need for better proof-reading.

Some people are not receiving The Herald.

The need for information on new members.

Use less space for outreach and devote more to areas like "Meet the Congregation." High-light individuals who have had a positive impact on the church and the community. Share events and announcements to leave more space for "Meet the Congregation" articles

Link The Herald on the church's website to the Facebook page.

Changes to be Made as a Result of the Survey Results

The Village Chapel plans to begin including short articles introducing new members. The Farewell articles will focus more on the member's life at The Village Chapel rather than duplicating what would be in the obituary. We will explore and implement, if possible, modifications to make The Herald more mobile friendly. The Herald will be linked to the church's Facebook page. Anyone who is not getting The Herald can call Heather and ask to have a copy mailed to them. More hard copies will be printed and placed at entry points at the church for anyone to pick up when they come in.
