Having an opportunity to visit the Holy Land is a once-in-alifetime pilgrimage!

Well, the opportunity has arrived. Pastors Ashley and Vickie Smith will lead a group from the Chapel and community on a 10-day trip to Israel. Monday, January 20, 2025, we will depart JFK to Tel Aviv, Arriving at Tel Aviv's Ben-Gurion Airport, we will be met by our Israeli tour guide and escort. Throughout our time in Israel, our guide will instruct us on the many sites we will visit and their relationship to the religion, history, archeology, culture, and modern life in Israel.

Places to visit will be Caesarea, Megiddo, Galilee, Nazareth, Cana, Tiberias, Sea of Galilee, Capernaum, Mount of Beatitudes, Caesarea Phillipi, Jordan

River, Jordan Valley, Jerusalem, Mt. of Olives, Bethlehem, Masada, Dead Sea, Ein Gedi, Qumran, Western "Wailing" Wall, Temple Mount, Golgotha, and more! We will return to JFK on Wednesday, January 29, 2025. The trip is all inclusive. The cost is \$3,200 which includes roundtrip airfare from JFK; top-quality fourstar hotels; full buffet breakfast and dinner daily; transportation by air-conditioned motor coach and licensed, English-speaking guide; airport taxes and airline fuel sur-



charges; "love offerings" tips for guides, driver, restaurant staff and housekeeping staff. WHAT IS NOT INCLUDED: The cost of obtaining a U.S. Passport, roundtrip air fare from RDU to JFK, meals and beverages for lunch, travel insurance, personal items, etc. If you are interested in going, a non-refundable deposit of \$300 per person is due upon registration. Final payment is due on October 1, 2024.



Meet the Congregation-The Raffaele's



When the writer asked Jack if they would consent to doing an article for The Chapel Herald, he protested a little saying, "We've already been interviewed in the past." That was soon after George Trail started the newsletter for the congregation a number of years ago. After talking about how much time had elapsed and how things have changed since then (more new members), he agreed an article on the Raffaeles would be okay.

Jack was born in Brooklyn, NY where his father managed a grocery store. Bev was born in Punxsutawney, PA., home of the famous groundhog. Jack attended a military school (Fork Union Military Academy) for his high school years before attending and graduating from Syracuse University with a degree in geography. Bev attended Bay Path during her college years and majored in administration. Jack always admired his older brother who was a WWII veteran ("he was my hero!") and this helped steer him to a career path in the United States Army which began after his college graduation. He and Bev married in 1960 and she was able to go with him to some of his post assignments except tours like Viet Nam where he served for one year. He served 27 years in the military. He achieved the rank of lieutenant colonel and felt he had given a number of good years of service to his country so he began to consider retirement. He took a job with an insurance company and they made their home in Connecticut. He enjoyed his work with the company but after several years it went through some transitional changes and he felt that it was time to fully retire. Where would they go after this?

He and Bev had visited Jack's mother and father when they lived in Pinehurst in the 1970s. They had already met some people who lived here and Jack enjoyed playing golf at times with George Trail. It felt very natural to make Pinehurst their retirement home and they moved here in 2001.

When asked how they decided on The Village Chapel for worship, Jack said they had often attended the chapels at army bases where he was stationed. Many were "interdenominational" or of faiths that felt very familiar to Bev and himself. Since they had gotten to know some people in the area who attended The Village Chapel it seemed very natural and comforting to join this church.

They have been faithful members ever since, giving of their time and resources to many ministries and projects. Jack has served twice on the Board of Trustees including the post of chairman during some turbulent times in the history of the church. Jack readily admits to feeling God's guidance and presence during this time. He also served as the first facilities manager for the church (there have only been two managers during the church's history). He serves on the Finance Committee, The Radio Ministry Committee and everyone has seen him usher for many years. Bev has also given much time to the church including the altar guild, singing in the choir, serving as a reader of scripture for the 11:00 service, and being active in the Chapel Women of the Church.

After getting to know some people in the area who attended The Village Chapel it seemed very natural and comforting to join this church. They have been faithful members ever since

In spite of all their dedication and work for the church they still make time to enjoy their family. They have one daughter, Wende, who lives in the Raleigh area. They also have two grandsons and two great grandsons. About 18 months ago they sold their house and now call Quail Haven their home. They are quick to praise the care and friendliness of the staff there and feel it is a good place to live.

Before the story ends, Jack would like to share with members at TVC how God intervened in his life in a strong and positive way in 2016. He suffered a serious stroke and had to be hospitalized at UNC/Chapel Hill from June until September. He was unconscious for weeks. The rehab took a long time, but God gave him the ability to work through this experience with few deficits. He is quick to point out that God's hand brought him through this.

Jack and Bev, thank you for your time and service to The Village Chapel. We appreciate you and all that you have done for this congregation since you came and all that you continue to do. We pray for God's blessings for the two of you.


2023 Women of the Chapel Fall Retreat

From the Director of Music

A s we all know, The Village Chapel is blessed with a fully functional carillon bell system, installed by the Maas-Rowe firm of California in 1988. With largely obsolete and occasionally temperamental technology, the sound of the carillon remains virtually the same now as 35 years ago.

While the sound of the carillon fills the village of Pinehurst and its surrounding golf courses, a reminder of its many capabilities may be valuable especially to our new members. The carillon plays three different sets of musical themes throughout each day. Every hour is announced with the well-known Westminster chimes, a familiar



hymn is played every half-hour, and ten minutes after 9am, 12pm, 3pm, and 6pm, a peal is played. In addition to these, hymns are programmed to ring throughout the village as members and guests enter and depart our worship on Sunday mornings. These are all pre-programmed from a control system located above the sanctuary. There are eight libraries of hymns, which are separated into liturgical season as well as broader themes. The hymns will normally change throughout the liturgical seasons and for patriotic occasions.

Well-documented is Payne Stewart's thoughtful remembrance of the chiming of Amazing Grace as he approached the 18th green on the final day of his triumphant U.S. Open victory in 1999. I had the opportunity a few years ago to speak to Ron Reid, a former USGA official who remembered things slightly differently as we know them, however the playing of Amazing Grace as the US Open came to a close is not disputed.

It is rare for a church to boast a campus that leaves an impression both visually and aurally and The Village Chapel is proud to hold claim to both.

Samaritan Colony – A place of hope & healing for families

The Problem

Few things carry more stigma than those struggling with alcohol or drug addiction. And yet, you would be hard-pressed to find a family that has not been touched by addic-

tion in some shape or form. The current opioid crisis is front and center in the news, both nationally and on a local level. This tragic epidemic has not spared North Carolina and our local communities.

And the statistics are frightening. The North Carolina Dept of Health & Human Services reports that in 2021, 4,041 people across the state lost their lives to a drug overdose. This is the highest number on record for a single year in North Carolina and reflects a 22% increase from the previous year. In Moore County, 30 residents died of a drug overdose in 2021.

Addiction tears apart families and leaves many children without parents. Additionally, the current opioid crisis puts tremendous strain on our first responders, local hospitals and urgent care centers, and our court systems.

A Local Resource Provides Treatment & Hope

A place of hope resides just over the Moore County line in Richmond County. Located on 25 acres in Rockingham, Samaritan Colony has been helping men in the Sandhills area overcome their struggles with substance use disorders for the last 48 years. Samaritan Colony, also known as "The Colony," has been a place of healing and recovery since 1975, when it opened its doors as a residential alcohol treatment facility. Over the last 48 years, Samaritan Colony has helped over 6000 men learn to live a life of recovery and helped families heal.

In 2020 the small nonprofit launched its "Changing Lives" Campaign to fund the construction of a second treatment facility on its campus dedicated to serving women strug-

gling with addiction. The five-year capital campaign has a fundraising goal of 5.3 million and consists of two phases. The first phase focused on raising 3.4 million to fund the construction costs associated with the new 14-bed treatment facility for Women.

With generous grants of 1.5 million from Sandhills Center and 1 million from the SECU Foundation, in addition to funding from numerous supporters, including many North Carolina-based foundations, the organization raised the money needed to cover the building costs. Construction began in late 2022. The organization has now set its sights on raising an additional 1.9 million, split between creating its first endowment fund and having three years of operating expenses in the bank before opening the **SECU Women's Recovery Center at Samaritan Colony.**

Samaritan Colony's clients are primarily from the Sandhills region, with approximately 45% residing in Moore County.



Program Description

Samaritan Colony's residential treatment program follows the 12-step approach, which few know is based on the Book of James. The organization has an onsite chapel, and attendance at Sunday spiritual services is a required part of the 28-day program. Sunday services at 9 am are also open to the public. At Samaritan Colony, no one is ever turned away due to lack of funds; however, treatment is not free. If an individual is willing to make the necessary lifestyle changes to live a life of recovery, the staff at Samaritan Colony will work to make it happen.

Samaritan Colony is a registered 501 (C)(3) nonprofit, and donations to the facility are tax deductible. For more information, visit www.samaritancolony.org


