## HERITAGE HALL

#### **November Update**

In October, we reported that Heritage Hall was going up. Now it is up!

As the photo shows, Heritage Hall is fully clad and roofed. The framing in all the rooms is completed. In the next week or so, you will see the brick work begin on one side of the building and the slate roof being installed on the other. The windows are on site and will be installed soon. Work on the interior will continue unimpeded by weather.

We are still on schedule and we are still on budget. The flooring and carpeting has been chosen and the fur-



nishings for the individual class rooms are on order. We will soon award a contract for the state of the art audio/visual system. The bottom line is that we are on track for completion of Heritage Hall in April and for the Certificate of Occupancy to be issued in May. The news, we are happy to report, is all good. Thank the Lord!



#### **Meet Ricky Gregson**

Ricky is the site superintendent for the construction of Heritage Hall. He lives in Carthage and has worked for O'Connor Company, our general contractor, for over 40 years. His wife of 30 years is a nurse at the Pinehurst Medical Clinic. Ricky has been a site superintendent for his entire career, and he estimates that he has overseen the construction of at least 50 building projects. He is truly an expert at the job of site superintendent.

As site superintendent Ricky is on site every day that work is ongoing. He schedules, coordinates, integrates and oversees the work of

dozens of subcontractors, each of whom has a particular job to do. He is responsible for ensuring that all work is done in accordance with plans and specifications, and that proper procedures, practices and safety measures are followed by everyone working on or around our building. Ricky answers questions from subcontractors and makes sure they know exactly what they need to do and how they are to do it. He also coordinates with the Village inspectors as each phase of construction is completed, and he manages the delivery of construction materials. As we all have noticed, Ricky runs a clean, neat and orderly job site. *(continued next page)*

I asked Ricky what he thought was special or unusual about Heritage Hall. His response:

"First, this is a well-designed building. Plans and specs are precise, clear and well thought out, which is not always the case. You have a good architect. Second, the Village has been easy to work with and very cooperative on this project. Again, local governments are not always so professional. Third, this team of subcontractors is one of the best that I have seen. I have had zero problems with any of them. And lastly, I like working for the Chapel. We at O'Connor feel like this is a special project for the Chapel, for O'Connor, and for Pinehurst. I, and O'Connor, will be very proud of this building when it is completed. Everything about it is going to be beautiful."

Bottom line: We are fortunate to have Ricky Gregson in charge of constructing Heritage Hall for us.

God offers a gift no strings attached. We must accept this gift unmatched.



Henry was in the ROTC in high school and received a full scholarship to Princeton University where he majored in economics and minored in music. Before graduating from Princeton in 1951, Henry had performed with a men's choir at the World's Fair and with the highly regarded Princeton Glee Club.

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After graduating from Princeton, Henry was assigned to Fort Sill, Oklahoma for training before being sent to Korea where he saw heavy combat duty as a forward artillery observer and was cited for heroism. Following his discharge from the army in 1952 he went to work with the R.H. Macy company.

When he later moved to St. Louis he became involved in a theater group where he met his future wife, Marie. They were married in 1959 and after the birth of their twin son and daughter, Henry and Abigail, they moved back east to New Jersey where they had anoth-

er son, Peter. Henry worked for the New York Telephone Company for 30 years retiring as a director of finance. After retiring, Henry and Marie moved to the Sandhills region.

Henry was able to pursue his passion for music here. He sang with the Moore County Choral Society and, attracted by the strong music program under John Shannon's direction, joined The Village Chapel choir. He never left. As he told Stephen Gourley, "music is in my soul".

Henry's life was not only about music, however. He was an avid gardener and runner; he acted periodically in small theater roles and was a voracious reader. And he was a wonderful family man - the backbone of the family who relished the time spent with his grandchildren.

The loss of his wife of 61 years was a great blow to Henry but he soldiered on, lending his excellent voice and musical talent to The Village Chapel choir as long as he was able. We will miss him but we are thankful that he shared his life and talents with us for so many years. Now he is at rest and we can imagine him and Marie making beautiful music together in God's choir. There was a man!
