

An Ancient Story for a New Year by Pastor Ashley

In the Book of
Nehemiah, the priest
Ezra—after traveling four
months from Babylon
(Iraq) to Jerusalem—
conducted one of the
famous, and perhaps first,
New Year's Day services
in The Bible. Ezra means

"help." He certainly lived up to his name by serving Israel while in Babylonian captivity, and later after the rebuilding of the Temple (Solomon's Temple).

Ezra was a descendent of Aaron— Israel's first High Priest—and was well versed in the priestly requirements and the Law of Moses. After receiving permission from the new Persian King, Artaxerxes, he led a second group of exiles back from exile around the year, 516 B.C.

Finding the first group of returned exiles in a state of spiritual depravity, he tore his clothes and called all the people together in the new year (Rosh Hoshana). Standing on what would have been a make-shift pulpit, Ezra boldly read The Law in the presence of the new nation of men, women, and children who now bore the name "Israel."

What can we learn from Ezra's story that might provide wisdom as we begin 2022? First, God always has a plan to bring us out of exile—be it spiritual or emotional or any separation of sorts—and restore us to a place of a life-giving relationship with Him.

Farewells



The Village Chapel lost one its heroes when former Senior Pastor Dr. Glenn Miller passed away in Beaufort, South Carolina on December 5, 2021.

Many of our new members never had the privilege to know him; however, all of our old-

er members remember him with great love and gratitude. He had to navigate some very rough waters while he was with The Village Chapel and then returned to guide us safely through a turbulent transition to a renewed spirit of unity.

Like many of his predecessors, Glenn came to The Village Chapel following a career as a military chaplain, in his case the U.S. Navy. Born in Long Island, NY, Glenn earned his Bachelor of Science degree from Tusculum College. He received his degree in divinity at Yale Divinity School and his doctorate from Columbia Theological Seminary. He was or-

dained as a United Methodist Minister in 1969 and served as pastor to two churches in Connecticut before being commissioned in the United State Navy in 1977. To say he had a distinguished career is an understatement. During his 20 years of service to hundreds of Navy, Marine and Coast Guard families, Glenn was awarded a variety of medals and commendations including the Navy Achievement Medal, the National Defense Medal and the Humanitarian Medal. It was our good fortune that in 1997 Glenn chose The Village Chapel for his post-military ministry.

As it turned out we needed him. He began his Chapel ministry as Associate Pastor to Ed Galloway and they made a formidable team; The Village Chapel grew and prospered under their leadership. When Ed retired in 2001, Glenn became the Senior Pastor. It was under his leadership that The Village Chapel inaugurated the family service that has become so popular and attracted more and more young people to our youth ministry.

When he retired from the Chapel in 2007, the 9:30 service had become an integral part of our ministry. (Continued on page 9)

The support from the Village Chapel family as I go away each summer is something truly special to me.

Around 2015, a documentary was filmed during camp and around several of our campers in the days that preceded camp, highlighting some of the challenges that young people who stutter deal with. While challenges are the focus of the film, the documentary also illustrates how intelligent, resilient, creative, and talented people who stutter can be.

OUTREACH



S leep in Heavenly Peace (SHP) had its start like many other charities, in a garage.

It was Christmas time, a time of joy and **L** happiness, a time of giving and love, but also a time of bitter, cold weather and snowstorms. A project, that was started with the build of one bed for a single family developed into something a whole lot more. With wood left over from the first bunk, another idea was created. "Who else could benefit from this bunk"? SHP is a group of volunteers dedicated to building, assembling and delivering handmade bunk beds to children ages three to seventeen that have no access to a bed. They have developed the slogan "No Kid Sleeps on the Floor in our Town". SHP was started in 2012 and by the end of 2018, SHP which was featured on Returning the Favor with Mike Rowe, had grown into a charity spanning 44 states with 270+ chapters and operating in four different countries.

In North Carolina alone they have seven chapters of which the NC-Sandhills chapter is one of the newest and began this past summer with their first build of 10 beds in June. Their Chapter President is Tom Bourne, he and his wife Yvonne reside in Pinehurst, moving here from Rochester, NY in retirement a couple years ago. When a bed is delivered, it is assembled on

site, but they don't just deliver a wooden bed and leave it at that. They also include a new mattress, sheets, pillow and pillowcase and comforter. Lowes Home Improvement is a partner with SHP and supplies tools and wood at reduced costs, which is awesome, but the bedding materials is another issue.

The Village Chapel will be sponsoring a 20 bed build for the children in Moore County. We expect the build to take place in the spring on the church's property with the help of our youth and other members who wish to participate. Usually, it takes about 3-4 hours for this type of build. More information will be sent out when a firm date is established.

n January, 2021 Moore Buddies Mentoring merged with Moore County Literacy Council to form The C.A.R.E. Group, Inc. The principal purpose of the merger was to create a more robust organization, serving more clients more effectively and at a lower cost. The C.A.R.E. Group offers remedial education programs for residents from cradle to retirement.

Moore Buddies Mentoring, Inc.

Mission- to champion successful children and youth through mentoring and empowering families.

In January 2022 this agency will initiate a new nutrition program for children in their structured day and mentoring programs. They will establish, stock and operate a kitchen. Nutritious and balanced meals and snacks will be provided for the children. They will be taught how to prepare simple meals for themselves, with lessons on hygiene and nutrition. The children will be involved in the preparation of the food and cleaning up afterwards. Teaching kids the basics of cooking will make them more self-reliant. Mastering these tasks will also improve their selfesteem. Ingesting a healthy meal or snack should improve their ability to learn and decrease bad behaviors which can be the result of poor nutrition.

Moore County Literacy Council, Inc.

This agency's mission is to work with others to significantly improve literacy in Moore County by Raising the awareness of low literacy in this county

Systematically identifying and coordinating the county's literacy resources

Energetically recruiting and training volunteers, using state of the art literacy resources

Providing volunteers with meaningful and life affirming experiences

Developing additional literacy programs and funding resources

Strategically providing literacy counseling and tutoring in our own facilities.

One to One Tutoring for Low Literacy Adults is just one of the literacy programs offered to adults in Moore County. Eighty volunteer tutors, including at least three Village chapel parishioners, work one-on-one with clients for 90 minutes every week seeking to help these adults overcome educational setbacks from early childhood.

Comfortably retired in Bluffton, South Carolina, Glenn nevertheless answered the call and provided the Chapel with another year of caring leadership at a time when the very survival of the church was threatened. For that we shall be eternally grateful.

Glenn was the quintessential pastor - kind, thoughtful, caring, wise possessing a keen sense of justice. He was a superb teacher and biblical scholar. He also had a wry sense of humor and easily entertained oth-

ers with his jokes and stories. He enriched our lives. As important as that decision was to the development Although he left the Chapel several years ago, we were always happy to welcome him back when he visited Pinehurst and we hoped that he and his wife Betty would be here for the dedication of Heritage Hall in a few months because Heritage Hall is, in a sense, the culmination of the developments he set in motion two decades ago. We miss him and we honor him. The key board for Heritage Hall was given by the Hamiltons to honor Glenn's love, devotion and invaluable service to The Village Chapel. We thank God for Glenn's life and that we at the Chapel were the beneficiaries of his service.
