Remembering Bill Wetmore

*B*ill Wetmore was good at a lot of things. But he failed at retirement.

Bill came to Pinehurst for the golf but saved all his best shots for the long shots. Leonard Tufts gave us Pinehurst's resort legacy. Donald Ross built the Home of American Golf. Frederick Olmsted gave us a charming village that rose from remote sandy soil.

Bill Wetmore gave us Pinehurst's village green. He gave us a memorial park honoring American military hero and former Truman cabinet secretary Gen. George C. Marshall, a post-World War II Pinehurst cottage owner. And he gave us a towering flagpole at the Carolina Vista traffic circle.

These are but three of the visions he saw to fruition in "retirement" after moving to Pinehurst in the late 1980s from northern Virginia. He also orchestrated SEEK, a collaboration of 22 area pastors who joined forces to advance community initiatives and empower elected officials to act on citizens' priorities. This collaboration was a natural extension of Bill's Christian faith journey begun in childhood in Pennsylvania. SEEK later organized a powerful service of unity after September 11, 2001.

But Bill's most enduring Pinehurst legacy likely will not be community projects. It certainly will be a weekly men's bible study he launched at The Village Chapel, which continues to this day even as Bill, 101 years young, has handed off duties to Chapel Senior Pastor Ashley Smith. (Bill passed into God's eternal kingdom on December 21, 2022).

Bill's bible study was highly regarded for its goal of applying scripture-based relevance to the lives of its participants, for its in-depth conversations and for its reputation as a standing calendar event that began promptly at 4 and ended promptly at 5. As time went by, its membership swelled as men from area churches, as far away as Laurinburg and Fayetteville, became regular attendees.

Bill Wetmore, a lifelong scholar, researcher, and educator, is first and foremost a disciple of God. A series of books he authored during the past decade capture his abiding, unwavering Christian faith. Among them is, "The Cross of Christ", published in 2015.

The Chapel's longer tenured members know the Wetmores as an adoring couple. Bill and



Nancy wed in 2005. They were acquaintances as members of Emanuel Episcopalian Church when Bill was married to Jane Wetmore, who passed away in 2004.

During our recent conversation about Bill's life and times, Nancy was tremendously helpful. Bill understates. Nancy takes it from there. She guided the discussion back to the 1950s, when Bill was a Los Angeles-based college professor in the realm of mechanical engineering. This was a period during which Bill engaged in activities that

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would chart the course of American history, eclipsing his already remarkable life achievements as a Duke University basketball star (1940s), and Lehigh University masters graduate who would become a Lehigh instructor and, later, UCLA professor, National Science Foundation director, and West Virginia University dean. Throughout, Bill engaged in extensive research projects tied to his expertise in thermodynamics.

Under the radar, Bill joined a small but gifted group of scholars – "brilliant minds," says Nancy -- who were dreaming big dreams, convinced that the United States was poised to be the pioneer of space exploration. These unsung heroes plotted a course that would soon break out of the shadows and appear on the radar of the U.S. government. During our recent conversation, Bill acknowledged that this space exploration team attracted inquiries that prompted trips to Washington designed to brief officials on how a space program would come into being.

And so it did.

The decades flashed by, but Bill's visionary instincts never waned. In Pinehurst, Bill sat one fine day on the porch having lunch at The Villager restaurant. He looked across the parking lot and saw in his mind's eye a public village green, open and inviting. Pinehurst inaugurated its village green as Tufts Memorial Park in 2013. Today, it is the home of Live After 5 Friday night concerts, Shakespeare in the Pines, a seasonal farmers' market, and the annual Christmas Tree lighting. Bill shepherded years of meetings and persistent lobbying, and, even after local government ultimately took on and took over the project, Bill's village green became reality. That same dogged persistence saw a monument and park honoring Gen. Marshall become reality in 2014, after Bill Wetmore, then 93, took it on as a civic duty. Marshall retired in Pinehurst after authoring the post-World War II Marshall Plan to reconstruct European countries and serving as Secretary of State and Secretary of Defense. By the time the Pinehurst memorial was christened, local media reports credited its debut to local elected officials. Bill was happy to stay out of the limelight.

Bill and Nancy recommend no herbal remedies or special elixirs to maintain senior vibrancy. But they are committed to staying in a positive frame of mind. "Bill doesn't watch the news," Nancy says, "but he always seems to know what is going on."

And above all, advises Bill, derive positivity by walking with God in constant companionship, seeking wisdom from the Bible and its lessons, and relying on the power of prayer.

*Bill passed on December 21. His life and legacy of Christian discipleship will never be forgotten.


Dear TVC Families,

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Finance Committee

The Finance Committee, chaired by Kay Goulet, works throughout the year to monitor the expenditures and revenues of TVC, count the cash and checks received in the weekly offerings, and prepare the annual budget for presentation to the Board of Trustees.

Other members of the Finance Committee include Pamela Bradley, Peter Gross, Dick Haefele, Jeff Holm, and Jack Raffaele.

The Finance Committee's budget process starts as early as September, when all committees of the Church prepare their best estimate of costs for their programs in the next year. These include the costs for Worship Services, our Music Program, the Children's Program, Salaries and Benefits for our staff members, Office costs (paper, printing, telephones, etc.), Maintenance and Groundskeeping, Outreach, Communications, etc. These cost estimates are submitted to the Finance Committee, which reviews them, compares them with the previous year, and asks for more information when needed. It is a process that everyone takes seriously.

As with any budget, the Finance Committee must look not only at expenditures but also at revenues. At TVC, this is referred to as "Pledge and Plate." The Stewardship Committee asks all members to "pledge" to give a stated amount of money to TVC in in monitoring the resources of TVC. the next year. Added to that is the money given in

the collection plate each Sunday (by members and visitors), plus money that is dropped off or mailed to the Church by those who wish to support the mission of TVC. While pledges form an important role in determining revenues, they traditionally cover less than half of projected costs.

The good news is that historically, many members give more than the amount they pledged, and visitors and other sources of income (weddings, etc.) add to total revenues. In addition, some current and past members support TVC through their generous gifts of "endowed" funds. These funds are part of what is known as The Foundation. The Foundation is governed by its own Board and provides annual support to specific areas of need, as specified by each fund within the Foundation. The Foundation funds are managed by a professional investment manager, who is not affiliated with TVC. Some of the endowed funds in The Foundation were established fifty years ago; the most recent endowed fund is The Scholarship Fund, which was established in 2022. The resources of The Foundation have enabled TVC to honor the wishes of its donors and to strengthen the services and programs at TVC to an extent that would not be possible based solely on the pledge and plate resources.
