Juan Russ

The Village Chapel has for years enjoyed the reputation of having one of the finest music programs among churches in the area. Part of that success is the in large part due to the very fine music directors we have had over the years. But even the best leaders in any field need the best human resources to set the high standards to which the aspire. In that regard, few Chapel regulars would be able to recall when Juan Russ was not leading the procession for the 11 o'clock service. Juan has been a stalwart of the Village Chapel choir since 1991 and has been leading the processional since about 1995, nearly 25 years. It is difficult to imagine the Chapel Choir without him.

Juan has played an especially important role these last few months in keeping vocal music alive in our services as we have scaled back due to coronavirus concerns. His presence in our services cannot be overstated and we are so grateful for his time and his talents.

Unfortunately, we are going to have to adjust to a new reality as Juan will be stepping away from the Chapel choir. Anyone who knows Juan knows that music is his passion in life. He began singing while he was still in grammar school in Pinehurst and continued through middle school and at Pinecrest High School, where he graduated in 1978. Juan attended the Sandhills Community College for two years before finishing his bachelor's degree at the University of North Carolina, Wilmington in 1982. He continued singing in glee clubs and choruses while doing his university studies.

Through the years since graduation, Juan maintained his passion for music and is closely identified with the music programs of Moore County. In addition to his years with the Village Chapel, he has been singing with the Moore County Choral Society since 1987 and with the Golf Capitol Chorus since 1986. He still sings from time to time with his home church, St. Paul Missionary Baptist Church of Pinehurst.

Juan met music director emeritus John Shannon while both were singing in the Moore County Chorale and in 1991 John invited Juan to sing with the Chapel choir. Over the 29 years Juan has been singing with the Chapel Choir, he was a close friend and associate of some of the Village Chapel choir legends who are no longer with us - Alzira Mason, Don Sommerville, Ron and Linda Stamey, Susie Hess, Judy Van Steenberg, Gene Hilsby - to name just a few. We are most fortunate to have had a man of Juan's musical talents and personal character and we are grateful for all that he has contributed to the Chapel's music program over the years. We will miss his voice, his attitude, his sense of teamwork and his leadership but we can look forward to his return on special occasions in the months to come. As he leaves us, we want to offer our profound gratitude for his contributions to our music program and to wish him nothing but the best in the future. Thank you, Juan.

Hunter Hess Farewell



We have been blessed at the Village Chapel with so many interesting, personable and dynamic individuals from all walks of life. Good Christians who literally did God's work in so many ways. There is no better example than Hunter Hess, whose untimely death in early December stunned all of us. How do you describe Hunter? A song from The Sound of Music inquired "how do you hold a moon beam in your hand?". Perhaps with Hunter it should be "how do you hold a sun beam in your hand?".

The Lord called Hunter home on December 3, 2020. Maybe God just needed some more sunshine in heaven because there was no shortage of prayers. Born June 19, 1956, Hunter was just 64 but he lived his life to the fullest and made life a little better for everyone who knew him. From the beginning it was clear that he knew what he wanted to do with his life. In

that regard, he was very much like his mother, Suzie Hess, who sang in the Village Chapel choir for many years and was one of the first members of the Joyful Noise, the 9:30 service choir. Hunter was born in State College, Pennsylvania, the home of Penn State University, Joe Paterno and the Nittany Lions. His mother had graduated from Penn State and stayed in State College to teach. The obvious path for Hunter seemed to be to attend Penn State and perhaps follow his mother into music. Instead, he headed south to Florida State to follow his dream of a career in the food and catering business, another path to making people happy. And he was good at it. He used his degree in hotel and restaurant management to carve out a successful and satisfying career.

We at the Village Chapel were the beneficiaries of his skills, training and personality. Hunter was, in every thing he did. the epitome of enthusiasm. He had an infectious laugh, a ready smile and a warm, engaging manner toward everyone whether an old friend or new acquaintance. He lent his culinary talents to help make Break NIghts something special. And his wife, Barbara, usually was there giving him a hand. He and Barbara also sang in the choir for several years. And every Christmas, they hosted a Christmas party at their home, with the largest tree in town, where the Chapel carolers gathered after their annual visit to shut ins. Beyond the Chapel, Hunter had a huge impact on the local restaurant scene. In addition to restaurants he owned and managed, he consulted with other well known watering holes - at the Rooster's Wife, the Drum and Quill, Maxi's, among others.

But we will remember Hunter mostly for his courage, his optimism in the face of adversity and his enduring good will. Hunter lost a leg to diabetes. No problem. He got a prosthetic and kept on trucking - in the kitchen and on the golf course. Then came kidney issues, weekly dialysis sessions and an uncertain future. Well, not uncertain for Hunter. He faced the situation with aplomb, took life as it was dealt and began looking for a kidney donor. After a couple years he found a match but he had to have a knee op first. Hunter laughed and took on the challenge. Then the kidney op was successful and Hunter planned to be back on the golf course without any extra strokes for his travails. But hospitals are dangerous places sometimes. Somehow, Hunter contracted the COVID-19 19 while recovering from the kidney transplant and suddenly what appeared to be a great triumph of resilience and determination over adversity turned into a tragic loss for his family and all of us.

Goodbye, Hunter. How we will miss you and the sunshine you brought to our lives and to the Village Chapel. But we know you are in God's saving grace and warm embrace and we must be thankful for having you as part of our lives for so many years and for all you have meant to us and the Village Chapel. Rest in peace, old friend.

2020 Year End Report

The Village Chapel Congregation:

The year 2020 has been an unusual and challenging year for all of us individually as well as for The Village Chapel. It has also been a very eventful year for The Chapel and the Lord has blessed our church in many ways during this difficult time. The Board of Trustees is pleased to provide this year-end report on some of the key events of the year and to thank all of you for your continued faithfulness to our church.

The biggest event of the year was the progress of our new facility, Heritage Hall, which was overwhelmingly approved by the congregation in February and by the Village of Pinehurst in July. The engineering design phase of the project has continued since then and we expect to get final VOP approval and ask for construction bids in early 2021. We eagerly anticipate that groundbreaking will take place in early 2021! The congregation's generosity in contributing to the Heritage Hall project has been a huge blessing. We are very close to our goal of \$3 million, so that Heritage Hall will open free and clear of any debt. The board, the pastors and the congregation are excited as we look forward to this new chapter in the ministry of The Village Chapel in our community.

Early this year, when the Covid-19 pandemic forced us to temporarily discontinue live services, we might have expected a financial hardship for the church. As the year progressed, the faithfulness of our congregation in providing continued financial support became clear and we are blessed to end the year in good financial condition. This is also true for The Village Chapel Foundation, which saw a significant decline in the early months of the pandemic but more than fully recovered by the end of the year. The board is pleased to report that our church and the foundation are in excellent financial condition.

The pandemic created an opportunity to help another local church. Around mid-year, it came to our attention that the Redeemer Presbyterian Church needed a place to worship. They had been using facilities at the O'Neal School and had to find another place to worship after the school closed due to the pandemic. The Village Chapel pastors and board saw this as an opportunity to assist our brothers and sisters in Christ and agreed to let them use our sanctuary for their Sunday afternoon services. The Redeemer congregation has been meeting in The Chapel every Sunday since then and we thank the Lord for the opportunity to help them.

The pandemic increased the importance of live-streaming and recording our services, as many of our members and attendees chose to attend services in this way. This revealed a need to improve the church's audiovisual capabilities. To address this need we created a new position to be responsible for this technology. We welcomed Steve McKenzie back to our church to fill this new role and we are also making some A-V equipment upgrades. We hope you are already hearing and seeing improvement.

Earlier this year, Pastor John expressed a desire to gradually transition to Pastor Ashley some of his responsibilities as our Senior Pastor after he reached his 65th birthday. As a result, the board worked with him and Pastors Ashley and Vickie to develop a transition plan that will take place during 2021. The plan was approved by the board and announced to the congregation in September. When the plan has been fully implemented, Pastor Ashley will become our Senior Pastor and Pastor John will assume a temporary position as

Pastor Emeritus in 2022. The board is thankful for the opportunity to make this transition smoothly, gradually, and effectively; and in a way that benefits all our pastors.

During the second half of the year, the Board conducted a review of the Strategic Plan which had been completed in 2015. The review was led by Carole Southon and Dee Park. The review concluded was that most of the action items identified in the Plan have been completed or are underway, a few are no longer relevant, and steps were identified to continue other action items as warranted.

The terms of three members of the Board of Trustees expired at the end of 2020 (Carole Southon, Jim Voelkel and John Rowerdink) and they are thankful for the opportunity to serve our church in this way. We also welcome three new members: Yvonne Gale, Sam Clay and Jon DeVault, and a new Treasurer, Kay Goulet. Thanks also to Alex Del Bueno, who served as our Treasurer until health reasons made it necessary for him to resign, and to Peter Gross, who filled in for him during the last few months of the year.

As 2021 begins, we are hopeful that we will soon be able to resume a normal worship schedule. We look forward to that with anticipation and in thankfulness for God's blessings and the continued faithfulness of The Village Chapel congregation.
