

Former President Jimmy Carter Attends
The Village Chapel



Just inside the entrance of the restaurant and off to the side, stood "Jimmy and Rosalynn." They were very approachable, and we were able to enjoy a conversation with them. I remember the former president saying that he was going back to Plains, GA to teach his weekly Sunday School class. We enjoyed a wonderful evening of fellowship and conversation with The Carters and The Stapletons.

I decided to write this article after hearing that the former president had passed. 100 years of life! Jimmy Carter was the longest living U.S. President. He has now been reunited with Rosalynn, who passed in November of last year, and with our LORD. I wanted to share my personal memory and experience and write a brief homage to the only former president (or sitting president), that I know of, that has ever visited The Village Chapel.

The year was 2011. I'll never forget standing in the Chapel's administration building in front of the administrator's office (Steve Mckenzie's current office). Three people came walking in, one through each entrance—East, North, and West entrances. Turns out, they were Secret Service agents. I asked if I could help them. I learned that they had come to map the layout of the Chapel's campus. Fromer President Jimmy Carter and former first lady Rosalynn Carter were to attend a wedding that I was officiating on the upcoming Saturday, which was normal protocol for a former president attending a semi-public event.

On cue, I walked from the vestry, acknowledged the altar, and turned to face a nave filled with smiling faces. Sitting in the front row—pole position—was the former president and his wife. I was a bit nervous. The Stapleton family, from Fayetteville, NC (relatives of the Carters) was counting on me to "tie the knot," so I focused on the sacrament of matrimony.

"The Gospel of the Kingdom"

In January our minds naturally focus on our plans and expectations for the upcoming year. Often I will pick a word or phrase that I feel led to hold onto as I move through the year, and this year the phrase is "The Gospel of the Kingdom." This comes from several places in the Word of God, one of which is Luke 16:16, "The law and the prophets were until John. Since that time the Gospel of

the Kingdom of God has been preached, and everyone is pressing into it."

The word "Kingdom" has two distinct parts. The first is obvious and it is king, in this instance it is Christ. The second part is -dom which is referring to domain or dominion, and when you put these two together we see the meaning of kingdom is a king's domain. In Revelation 19, we get a picture of the Gospel of the Kingdom as Christ is riding on a white horse as a warrior into battle, and His armies are following. The King is riding into battle with His army, taking back what is rightfully His. This battle is not with flesh and blood for as Paul says in Ephesians 6, "we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places."

There are a few things that I am choosing to focus on this year, and I hope you will as well. Firstly, spiritual warfare is real and can easily be defined as the typical Christian life. To be a child of God, is to have Satan as your adversary. From the first day the "spiritual hosts of wickedness" will be seeking to destroy your faith, family, and anything else they can. This is a battle, but praise God we have Christ leading us into the battle, and His name is King of Kings and Lord of Lords. We have nothing to fear, but we need to acknowledge that spiritual warfare is all around us.

Secondly, Paul describes the "Armor of God" in Ephesians 6 by we can stand fast against the evil one. The belt of truth, the breastplate of righteousness, the Gospel of peace, the shield of faith, the helmet of salvation, and the Sword of the Spirit which is the Word of God. To survive and thrive in the battle, our focus must always be on our relationship with God. One preacher once told me that the key to the Christian life is to, "Stay close, and stay clean." Maintain a daily, close relationship with God and keep yourself pure before Him.



Finally, Paul tells us in Ephesians 6:18 that our chief "weapon" in this spiritual war is prayer. I think we often pray for our friends, loved ones, and even strangers. We pray for people in need and dire situations. But do we pray that God would advance the Kingdom of Light against the kingdom of darkness? Do we pray that God would eliminate all His enemies surrounding a person or situation, that He would "bind the strongman" as Jesus says. Do we pray with a focus on the real enemy, not flesh and blood, but against Satan and his legion of darkness? This is warfare prayer, recognizing the spiritual nature of life and place our hope and trust in the One who brings victory.

May we this New Year remember the Gospel of the Kingdom, put on the whole armor of God, and follow the King of Kings and Lord of Lords into the battle. God bless you all!


