

Village Chapel family, Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

2 Corinthians 1:2

While recently driving on a back country road "Down East," I noticed the wheat fields beginning to turn brown. I said to Vickie, "the Day of Pentecost is near." The wheat ripens in North Carolina at the same time it does in Israel, and you can keep time by the color of the wheat. This agricultural motif holds a spiritual meaning that helps us to understand Pentecost.

In the Old Testament, the Jews observed *Shavout* – which they call the Feast of Weeks. They called it the Feast of Weeks, because it was 7 weeks (7 Sabbaths) and 1 day, which equals 50 days, or "Pentecoste" in Greek, which means 50th. The feast was quite literally the "first fruit" of the wheat harvest

The 50 days would start on Passover, and on the fiftieth day, the farmer of the wheat would tie off a bundle of stalks to be harvested first. The bundle would be present-

ed to the priests in the temple, as a "first fruit offering."

Christians now understand the first fruit offering in a similar way, but instead of wheat, it symbolizes souls. When the 3,000 Jews – from all over the Middle East – heard the Gospel and were filled with the Holy Spirit, they were the first to be harvested (saved), of the billions who have come to put their faith in Christ. But unlike the seasonal harvest, it's always harvest time; that's why Jesus refers to the world as a field, ripe for harvesting.

So, if you think of the Day of Pentecost in this way, then we understand that it was the birthday of the Church. Those people who repented and believed, and filled with the Holy Spirit, were the first Christians – the first fruits of the harvest to come. We are a part of that harvest! We too, have been filled with the same Pentecostal Spirit and power. Let us worship the LORD and glorify Him, as we pray for the spiritual harvest to continue in our homes, our Chapel, and in our community.

The Raleigh Ringers

Saturday, May 14, the Raleigh Ringers brought their amazing show to the Village Chapel. Attendees were mesmerized by the renditions performed by the 16 piece ensemble led by David Harris. The show features unique interpretations of sacred, secular and popular music, including famous rock 'n' roll tunes arranged just for handbells.

The Raleigh Ringers use the most extensive collection of handbells and bell-like instruments owned by a single performing group in the world. The current grand total is 35 octaves composed of 377 individual pieces of equipment.



Similar to the way pipe organs utilize different ranks of pipes, each individual handbell set has its own unique sound.

By mixing the sounds together, handbell ringers are able to create contrasting moods and highlight melodic lines. A piece of music can take on a new personality simply by playing sections of it on a different brand or design of handbells.

Most of us have seen our 15 passenger TVC bus at some point. The bus is sometimes used to pick up Chapel members from area nursing homes on Sundays and for youth trips a few times a year. Otherwise it is rarely used.

Our bus is a resource that can be used for any Chapel sponsored event around the local area or within a day's drive. The bus is in excellent mechanical condition, easy to drive and fairly comfortable....and the Chapel pays for the gas.

No special driver's license is required for this size vehicle. The bus is parked at the Care Cottage.






