"Is this really happening?": Antisemitism in Moore County and the United States



Banners with Nazi symbols being hung in public? In 2023? In our hometowns? Are you serious! It's a bit surreal to think that antisemitic ideologies still exist. Perhaps, I'm showing my naivete.

One incident occurred during the time of year when our local Jewish community was preparing to observe Hanukkah, which interestingly enough, is another context of antisemitism on a governmental, mass scale. I read recently that there were almost three thousand cases of antisemitic harassment, vandalism, or assault in 2021-almost three thousand! It's the most incidents ever reported since the Anti-Defamation League starting keeping track in 1979.

Is it just me, or does everyone seem to be picking on the Jews? Why the Jews? I'm well aware that prejudice and racism are experienced by more people that the Jews. But the holocaust! Even today, the Jews are the bane of every country around them. They occupy one of the smallest plots of land in proportion to their neighbors. Can't the world just leave them alone? Over there and over here.

Do you realize that God gives caution in scripture about mistreating the Jews? God told Abraham in Genesis chapter 12, verses 2-3:

"I will make you into a great nation, and I will bless you;

I will make your name great, and you will be a blessing.

I will bless those who bless you, and whoever curses you I will curse;

and all peoples on earth will be blessed through vou."

Although we know that God loves all people, and values the life of all, He specifically mentions a blessing and a warning about the Jews. Is it really wise for churches today to make a stand against supporting Israel? As some have done in the name of "religious correctness." Meet the Congregation

Donna & Kevin Brundage

Ze both grew up in Williamstown, in The Berkshires of Massachusetts and lived there over 45 years. We met in our teens at Kevin's family's HoJo's restaurant where he was a bartender and I was a waitress. We married in 1977. Dear Amy was born two years later and sweet Jenni in 1983. Kevin owned his own business for seven years and then went into land sales, (he is a selfemployed land trader) which he is still involved in today. He has bought and sold land all over the U.S., from New England to New Mexico to Florida and places in between! I was a nanny for many years and helped raise ten children. Also, I have sewn over 300 fabric house portraits. I then went on to own and operate two gift stores, one in Williamstown and one in Lakewood Ranch, FL where we lived for 11 years. We have two wonderful sons-by- marriage, and four amazing grandchildren.

Kevin was raised in the Episcopal Church and I in the First Congregational Church. I have always been intrigued with the Catholic faith and weekly stream services from St. Patrick's Cathedral in NYC. This is why we choose to attend the 8:15 Eucharist Service as it is very similar to what Kevin grew up with and it comforts me. The first time Kevin visited Pinehurst, to see if it would be a good fit for us, he sent me a video of him walking around Tufts Park and the Chapel's bells were ringing. Before we even moved here we said we wanted to visit The Village Chapel and the first time we did; we felt so connected and at home with the Church, the Pastors and the people, so.....we never left! We still watch that video, just to hear our Church bells ring!

We came to Pinehurst in 2017 for health reasons and for a lower elevation as we lived at 6600' in Colorado. In March 2016, in Colorado Springs, just as we were about to board an airplane; my heart went into spasm and I passed out, straight into Kevin's arms. I was shocked back to life over 40 times, put on a heart pump and breathing tube. When Kevin asked the Doctor "what is the plan", he was told "to keep Donna alive today". The Doctor said I was within an hour of being air-lifted to Denver to be put on life support. When the ER Chaplain whispered in my ear "do you believe in Jesus?" I knew then that I was close to dying. I whispered back "YES" and I know with everything in me, Jesus heard me. After a diagnosis of Idiopathic Ventricular Fibrillation, an ablation (after which I had a cardiac arrest and was given chest compressions), the insertion of an ICD (Implantable Cardioverter Defibrillator), and 10 days in the hospital, I survived!! My heart had no damage and was working at close to 100%. Our daughters and sons were there continually and have been so strong and have strengthened me every day since.

So, so many miracles occurred during this whole experience and it humbled us greatly.

Beginning with my husband saving me by constantly waking me from unconsciousness, and my sweet pup who

stood on my chest, licking me awake and giving Kevin time to call 911. We considered ourselves as faithful, religious people but what we went through as a family, deepened our faith to a level we had never known existed. As we have faced many more struggles, with each one we lean on Our Father and Our God and we celebrate being strong in Christ, in spite of our insecurities. Yes, I had amazing doctors and medical staff, who we will forever be grateful for and hold in our hearts, but we know without a doubt it is through God's Blessings and Grace that we are able to celebrate my "Happy Alive Day" each March 8th. We share this very personal story, to bring hope, as we truly believe each day for each person is a gift from our Lord and is to be cherished and lived with purpose. Also, to remember that every one of us has a story. And yes, God's miracles absolutely do happen!

They enjoy playing pickle ball and tennis, cooking and gardening as well; Ned also plays the piano




JOHN & MARY O'MALLEY

"A Season of Fasting"

It is March and we are firmly planted in the season of Lent. Lent is a "Penitential" season, the same word that we derive penitentiary from. It means expressing sorrow over past wrongs, and thus a penitentiary is a place to express that sorrow...behind bars. This season is marked by fasting and somber worship services, like those found on Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday.

One of the unique aspects of this season that permeates all of Christendom, is that it is recognized as a season of fasting. Growing up in Mobile, Alabama we would celebrate Mardi Gras every year. A fun trivia fact, most people believe Mardi Gras originated in New Orleans, however the

truth is that it was started in my hometown of Mobile.

Mardi Gras or "Fat Tuesday" began as a time of feasting and merriment prior to the start of Lent, so that everyone could spend one last day of freedom before the penitential season. However, throughout the years Mardi Gras has expanded from the Tuesday prior to Ash Wednesday, into a three week raucous affair filled with beautiful floats and an overconsumption of moonpies. This was one of my favorite times growing up, yet in many ways it speaks of our society at large.



For the majority of the history of the Church, and Western Civilization at that, there were times of feasting and there were times of fasting. And I dare say that the majority of the year was spent in moderation. But today is seems that as we in the United States have been blessed, we have also turned our year into a perpetual season of feasting. It is Mardi Gras year round.

We eat what we want, drink what we want, feast when we want. However, this metaphorical year-round Mardi Gras rarely ends on Ash Wednesday. Whether it is Mobile or New Orleans, the feasting just leaves the streets and enters the restaurants, taverns, and homes. There is never a season of fasting, life becomes a

perpetual feast.



I think that is why now, more than ever, a season of introspection and fasting is needed. A time to separate ourselves from the chaos of the world, a time to separate ourselves from the never-ending feast and perhaps enter into peace. Perhaps we can even learn the most important lesson a consumer society can ever learn, "Man does not live on bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God."
