"The Spirit of Eastertide"

What a wonderful time of year – the season from the Resurrection to Pentecost! An exegesis on our recent lectionary text of John 20 -

the story of "Believing, Courageous Thomas" – reminds me of how significant and crucial the presence of the Holy Spirit is to Eastertide. If you recall, when Jesus appeared the first time to the ten disciples (Thomas was not present, nor was Judas Iscariot), Jesus "breathed" on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit."(v.22) The Hebrew words for "breath" and "spirit" are the same, but the Greek words used to describe Jesus "breathing" on the disciples gives us our English word, "infuse." The disciples were "infused" with the Holy Spirit. Later we know they were all filled with the Holy Spirit, not with Jesus's gentle breath – the very breath of God – but this time in a "mighty rushing wind." (Acts 2:2)

The gospel of John tells us that the Holy Spirit wasn't given until Jesus was "glorified," (John 7) meaning that Jesus had not yet ascended into heaven. Jesus said: "And I will pray [to] the Father, and He will give you another Helper, that He may abide with you forever—the Spirit. (John 14:16-17; NKJV).

Eastertide serves as a divine segue to The Day of Pentecost and the season to follow, with its glimpses of the fulfillment of the Spirit, and its brief "charismatic" encounters with Jesus that foreshadow the Spirit's fullness. It keeps both the empty tomb and the Promise fulfilled in sight and intertwines them beautifully to help us make the connection of what comes after death has been defeated – God not only with us (Incarnation), but God in us! (Spirit Baptism).

As we worship through the Season of Eastertide, enjoy the casual, yet intentional reminders that the Gospels give us – the coming of the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of Christ.

"The Center of Gravity for Faith"

Astronomy has always fascinated me, and while I would not even consider myself an "amateur" astronomer, the love of the heavens persists. I enjoy it because it helps me to meditate on how small and insignificant I really am, as I ponder the magnificence of creation and the magnitude of our universe. When observing the universe, we can see that there is a "Center of Gravity" for everything.


Within our solar system, the center of gravity is the sun. The gravity from the sun keeps all the planets and a great many other objects in orbit. I was talking about this with my son one time, and I used a string attached to a ball as an example. I said that I was the sun, the string was gravity, and the movement of the ball was like the movement of a planet.

I then asked him what would happen if I was twirling the ball around me, and then cut the string. He said the ball would go flying off, it wouldn't

be attached anymore and the inertia would carry it away. It got me thinking, what is the center of gravity for

my faith? At times I would have said that it was the church I was attending, or the denomination that I was affiliated with. Perhaps more than anything, I would have said that it was the theological tradition that I grew up with.

It was a tradition that claimed that it alone had all the right answers, and everyone else was misguided at best, and heretical at worst. And I remember the season in life, when different influences began to pick apart that tradition and made me question all those "right answers." It was a very difficult time, because it felt like my entire upbringing in the Christian faith was being attacked and dismantled. I know that spiritual vertigo is not real, but that is what it seemed like.



Paul says two things that speak to those going through this situation. The first comes from 2 Corinthians 2:2, "For I determined not to know anything among you except Jesus Christ and Him crucified." (NKJV) This is a bold statement, and an excellent one to remember during this time of Easter. Paul could have preached anything. He could have tried to convince the people of any multitude of things, but he was determined to preach Jesus and Him crucified. This was Paul's center of gravity.

The second thing he says is found in 1 Corinthians 9:22, "I have become all things to all men, that I might by all means save some." (NKJV) Paul had an extreme focus on Christ, his mission and his method revolved around Christ and Christ alone. He was willing to change, evolve, and grow as long as Jesus was at the center. It is a string that will never be cut, and an anchor that will hold in every storm. We live in a world filled with obstacles and distractions. A world where truth is raged against or ignored. Let us place Christ at the center of our world and our lives, knowing that He alone is the rock.

Meet the Congregation

The Crutchfields

The Crutchfields grew up in Virginia and North Carolina, respectively. Ed graduated from Virginia Tech with an accounting degree and worked for the Virginia Department of Taxation (VDOT). Gerri graduated from a nursing program in North Carolina and initially worked at Moore Regional Hospital (then known as Moore Memorial Hospital). She later attended the University of Virginia pursuing a higher degree in nursing. Ed and Gerri met in a restaurant in a small town in central Virginia and where mutual friends introduced them. They began to see each other on a regular basis and a relationship developed. They were married in 1977 in the Baptist church where Ed grew up. They then settled in Harrisonburg, Virginia.

In 1978 a little girl named Laura was born. Due to multiple severe disabilities, caring for her proved to be emotionally and physically challenging. Doctors told them that she likely had a chromosomal abnormality and may only live a couple of months. Major crises required a number of medical or surgical procedures, but God provided a way through many tough situations. She lived to be 15 years old and, sadly, passed away in 1994. Ed & Gerri learned and grew from this experience and came through it with a stronger faith knowing that it was God who provided answers along the way.

After Laura's death, they learned to live a new life working and living in Charlotte. After 30 years working for the VDOT, Ed decided to retire so that they could move closer to family. An aging mother needed help and support with Gerri's disabled brother. Gerri was caregiver to both of them as well as to an elderly uncle until their deaths.

After all the years of caregiving, they were both ready to move on and seek a new life. They attended a Presbyterian church while living in Charlotte and then felt at home going to a small Presbyterian church after moving to Hoke County. In 2018 they decided to sell the family farm and move to Moore County. They bought a house in Southern Pines. They continued to attend our church in Hoke County, but with the onset of Covid and the subsequent closure of churches, they began to reconsider maintaining their membership.

They visited a number of churches in this area and felt drawn to The Village Chapel. Pastor John Jacobs extended a very warm welcome as did Pastor Ashley. Both made them feel at home. They really

After long-time member of The Village Chapel Jeremy Lashmit met someone at work wearing a Trail Life hat, he asked if he would explain Trail Life to him. From that point forward a spark of interest grew into a desire to know more. You see, Jeremy and his wife Lindsey were looking for Christian activities for their children who were not quite old enough for youth church activities. After a little research, they were soon able to find a Trail Life charter in Vass that had both troops under one roof. They proceeded to sign up their two oldest children. They loved it and were left wondering when they would get to go back. However, it was a logistical nightmare for Jeremy and Lindsey to have such a young family traveling that far and getting home so late on a school night. They didn't want to quit; they knew how important it was to their family.

Then, in 2021, Jeremy and Lindsey who are decade long members of The Village Chapel, met with the pastors and started making a plan to



bring the Trail Life and American Heritage Girls ministries to the Chapel. With the support of The Village Chapel it wasn't long before their charters for Trail Life Troops and American Heritage Girls NC 1898 became a reality. The unique nature that both troops come together under one roof on the same night allows the family to come together without everyone going different directions to different locations. For this reason, the Lashmits have chosen the selected verse for Troops NC 1898: Matthew 18:20 "For where two or three gather together in my name, there am I with them."

Despite all the hurdles they had to clear, their plan came to fruition on Wednesday, April 12, 2023. As nearly 60 interested and excited attendees, both children and adults, entered Heritage Hall to register, you could feel the excitement and joy. Once the pledge of allegiance was recited along with the Trail Life Oath, children and leaders disbursed to their rooms to learn more.

Lindsey states: "In the future we look forward to these ministries reaching out to the community and helping to grow the congregation through them. We have already seen that we have reached families

that don't attend our church as of yet, so we hope to see this pattern continue. We hope that this will become a family event in which moms and daughters as well as dads and sons can come together on Wednesdays through this ministry."
