

### **Expanding TVC's Mission into the Community**



When I think about marketing, I think beyond the typical advertising and marketing ploys of which we are most commonly aware. I think about marketing as "creating markets" – identifying needs and then meeting those needs. In TVC's case, developing ministry opportunities from within and for the community at large.

This Fall, we are planning to offer a Mothers' Morning Out (MMO) ministry and to partner with Classical Conversations (CC). Mothers' Morning Out seeks to provide families of our church and community with an opportunity to have short-term childcare, which will allow the parents to run errands, buy groceries, or just have some "me" time.

The ministry will run weekly, from Tuesdays through Fridays, in the Heritage Hall's Nursery. The ministry will be self-sustaining, and it will give our current nursery staff more needed hours above the usual four hours on Sundays.

There will be a nominal charge and registration is required. More importantly, this ministry will allow us to disciple

children with a Christ-centered curriculum, while building relationships with parents and families, in a Christian, inviting, spirit-filled atmosphere, located on our campus and fulfilling the intended purpose of our newly constructed Heritage Hall. "Lo, children are a heritage from the Lord!"

Classical Conversations is a university-modeled homeschool group, who meet weekly. Historically, we have hosted home school groups, and this ministry is equally compatible with our mission to reach others with Christ. CC has a God-centered curriculum, and it currently reaches approximately one hundred students, representing families from Moore County and surrounding counties. CC has an excellent reputation in our community, and we are honored to partner with this national organization, who are headquartered in Southern Pines.

The group will meet on Tuesdays at TVC during regular office hours, (January to April and August to November), and will utilize Heritage Hall, Sanctuary (for a 30-minute opening assembly), Chapel Hall, and the three conference rooms in the Administration Building. Meetings are currently underway to assess the impact this group will have upon staff and facility use. TVC will receive facility and staff renumeration to offset any incurred costs.

Overall, there will be a mutual benefit to TVC and CC. Again, we can highlight Heritage Hall and our campus, while building relationships with parents and families, and potentially being a place of



worship for those who are seeking a church home. Please help us prayerfully consider how to best implement both ministry opportunities. For more information, comments, and questions, please contact Pastors Vickie, Trey, and Ashley.

# "The Best Kept Secret of Christian Mission"

Have you ever wondered how you can become involved with fulfilling the mission of the church, the Great Commission of carrying the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the world?

t times in my life, it has felt like such a large task, that to envision being a part of it seems overwhelming. And maybe like me, you grew up in churches where sharing the Gospel was one of the dominant


themes in preaching and teaching. When I was very young, I was a part of "Mission Friends." If I remember correctly this was for children between the ages of four and seven. Every Wednesday night we looked at the life of a different missionary, and it was always so exciting!

The missionaries would be in the jungles of Africa, sharing the Gospel with people who had no concept of Christianity or Christ. We would see the children of missionaries and how they boldly carried the message of Jesus into very desperate situations. I truly loved my time in Mission Friends, and I learned much, but I can also remember feeling disconnected from what was happening. They were missionaries but I was not. They were in a "mission field" but I lived in the Heart of Dixie, Alabama.

The feeling I kept coming back to, and have had throughout my life, is that being on mission, fulfilling the Great Commission, can only be done by sharing a presentation of who Jesus Christ is and what He did for humanity. Now, is that being on mission? Absolutely! But is that the only way? John Dickson in *The Best Kept Secret of Christian Mission* makes the point that there are multiple ways to be "On Mission."

The first way he talks about is to follow the example of the One who was a "friend of sinners." Are we open to loving our neighbors no matter who they are, or what their lifestyle may be? Are we willing to be a friend of sinners? Please understand, I am not saying that we should "look for opportunities" to befriend sinners, that makes it seem like we are trying to sell people something. But do we genuinely love people because they are made in God's image, and because through our love the world sees Christ?

Another way he mentions is "promoting the Gospel through prayer." What he also terms the hidden mission because no one will ever see it. Do we pray for missionaries? Do we pray for pastors and teachers within the church? Do we pray for those within our circles, and also those outside of it, that the light of Christ would break through into their lives? This is a hidden mission but one that is so vital and one that we can all partner in doing.



One other that I would highlight, is promoting the Gospel through the work of the Church. Jesus says that we are the light of the world, we are like a city placed on a hill. When the world looks at us, they see the light of Christ as it shines into the darkness. Most of my life I have interpreted that to be the individual, that the individual Christian is like a city placed on a hill. Dickson, however, does a wonderful job of showing that perhaps we should interpret it in a corporate fashion, that "we" meaning the church, is like a city placed on a hill. When the ultimate task of evangelism and fulfilling the Great Commission is placed on us as individuals, it seems like an impossible feat. But through the Church, both local and throughout the world, we can and are called to accomplish this great task.

In closing I would encourage everyone, myself included, to be a friend to sinners and show the world what Christian love is. I would encourage us to pray more, in general and specifically for a lost and dying world and those working to spread the Gospel. And lastly, may we as a Church work together to further the Kingdom of God. God bless!

# Meet the Congregation- The Dillons



Polk Dillon grew up in Waynesboro in the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia. He attended UNC/Chapel Hill and the University of West Florida. His career path took him into the military and he became a Navy pilot flying missions in Vietnam. He also instructed helicopter pilots in Pensacola, FL. Including active duty and the Navy Reserves, he had twenty-five years in the Navy. After his active military career, he became a furniture representative working for several companies in Kansas, Iowa, and North Carolina.

They tell about Russell "wandering down" the street to The Village Chapel on Sunday mornings to attend services there and wear the carnation of an usher. The church welcomed him. Polk and Kathy bought him a carnation for those days. Russell has been an usher now for twenty-six years, by far the longest of any usher now serving. The pastor at that time, Ed Galloway, talked with Polk and then made Russell the official

usher of the balcony. He began to wear the white carnation signifying his position. To this day he carries out his duties faithfully and wears the carnation in his lapel. After Russell made his choice of church known, Polk said, "Kathy and I decided to join him!"

In thinking back over the years, they reflect on the positive actions that have taken place on the



part of the congregation and all that has been accomplished at The Village Chapel. Polk has been pleased to serve on the Foundation Committee, the Finance Committee, the Radio Ministry Committee, the Nomination Committee, and served as Chairman of the Board when we decided to build Heritage Hall.

# From the Director of Music

#### **Music Notes**

In last month's Herald, I wrote to you about the final concert in our Chapel Music Series, a program featuring choral music from the British Isles to be held on Friday, May 31, at 7:00PM. I previously previewed three pieces from this concert, and this month I'd like to preview three more.

Early in the concert we will offer *There is a Land of Pure Delight*, a hymn by Issac Watts and set to music by Grayston Ives, once a boy chorister at Ely Cathedral and later a member of the famed a cappella ensemble King's Singers. In Watts' poem, the glories of heaven are suggested rather than directly depicted, and looks with joy to the idea of an eternal home in heaven. Ives' melodic writing is on full display as he offers gradually ascending, sweeping lines first introduced by the sopranos, and carefully mirrors specific lines of text ("there is a land of pure **delight**" and "could we but **climb** where Moses stood?"). Written as a simple hymnanthem featuring recurring themes and with organ, it is the only piece of its kind on this program.

Orlando Gibbons' (1583-1625) setting of Hosanna to the Son of David will stand as our representative of music from the late Renaissance period. Gibbons, highly regarded as both an organist and composer, was known for his madrigals and sacred anthems. This piece, using text from the gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke, is an example of polyphony, a style of composition in which each melodic line is independent of another while also being imitative throughout. The various entries of the text in the opening section create the image of the crowd joyously shouting "hosanna" upon Jesus' entry in Jerusalem. There is a brief moment of "peace" where the choir sings in imitative block chords before resuming the polyphonic concept and singing of "glory in the highest places."

God be With Us is a short composition by London-

based composer Cecilia MacDowall set to a poem translated from **Carmina Gadelica**, a collection which includes various prayers, hymns, and blessings. MacDowall typically has one voice part singing her original melody while the others provide harmonic accompaniment, though in one section the sopranos and tenors sing in duo with each other. This piece, along with the Gibbons piece and two others on the program give the audience the opportunity to hear examples of unaccompanied music where the voices are completely exposed and working together to create both melody and harmony on their own.

Late in April, our singers assembled for the first time in the Chapel, and we experienced something truly exciting as we put this music together for the first time as an ensemble. The Chapel acoustic is perfectly suited for this program, and it will be a privilege to offer it. I hope you will join us.




# Mackenzie Lane Bowen

**Pilgrams Progress** provides a safe transition from detox to treatment. Our clients experience a loving and encouraging place to stay until their bed becomes available at a treatment facility. Meanwhile, they attend 12-step meetings and church services. It is our desire that everyone who comes to our house will experience a new life in Christ.

### **Our Vision**

Restore Christian values, reduce crime, and eradicate substance abuse.

On June 1, 2017, Pilgrim's Progress opened the doors to a safe house for men struggling with drug and alcohol addiction. Founders', Zak and Billy, met in a men's bible study and shared their common passion for suffering addicts. With a common passion and a desire to be obedient to God's calling, the two decided to oversee a house providing residency for men coming out of detox. Pilgrim's Progress is the medium from detox to treatment that allows men to transition to a safe house that focuses on instilling Christian values, allocating necessary resources, and impress Jesus' love on their hearts. In the past

year, over 100 men have entered our doors, all of which have experienced the compassion of God.

The acorn to the left of Pilgrim's Progress represents the beginning journey of the men that enter our doors. A pilgrim is one who journeys to a sacred place as an act of devotion. As these men journey with us, in the safe house, they will transform from an acorn to an oak tree. We realize the transformation requires time. This is why we do not adhere to the mile wide inch deep philosophy. Instead, we focus on Jesus' philosophy of discipleship: using unlikely people to accomplish extraordinary tasks. Spending time training these men to live a sober life, while maturing in their faith, equips them to re-enter society with resources to multiply the vision of restoring Christian values, reduce crime, and eradicate substance abuse.

Finally, there is a stone at the base of the tree that symbolizes a witness to the covenant that the people of Israel will follow and obey God. Applying scripture to our ministry, we believe the stone affirms their commitment to live a sober life and follow the way of a renewed life. (Joshua 24:21-27).
