Breaking Ground by Pastor John



Having broken ground last month for the building of Heritage Hall, we might consider how our past construction at The Village Chapel has connected us to the Body of Christ – a connection that, God willing, may live on in our new construction.

Last month, while Betsy and I were away, we worshiped at St. James

Episcopal in Wilmington, NC where, in 1923, a NY architect named Hobart Upjohn had designed their Parish Hall. Of the 150 churches and schools designed by Upjohn, fifty churches are in North Carolina alone. When Upjohn was designing for St. James, Wilmington, he also designed our first building, which not only connects us with the larger Body of Christ, but has served us and this community as a singular symbol of our Lord's abiding and powerful presence for the past 97 years.

Heritage Hall will be a building that will take our vision of Christian unity at The Village Chapel beyond this community to the world – and here's how. Originally and traditionally, people have been coming here seasonally or to retire – that's been the story for much of our history – but not anymore. Young people and children have only been a relatively recent reality in our Chapel's long history; but with this new building, they will be the ones who will take our vision of Christian unity to the world beyond here. Many of us don't plan on living anywhere other than here for the rest of our lives; but we can be assured, God willing, that our young people will take the saving grace they received here, and spread it like seeds on fertile grounds elsewhere.

This new building can be our umbilical cord to horizons unseen – the unlimited potential for growth in the Kingdom of God can begin right here – not only with a

These groups will be coordinated by Jim and Julie Huggins, as well as other team members who have come forward to assist them. The potential of these groups, and all small groups, is unlimited.

The benefits of small groups are numerous. From growing in one's faith to experiencing the intimacy of deepening relationships and genuine Christian fellow-

On the third Sunday of Easter, our Gospel reading from Luke was about the risen Christ, revealing himself to the disciples by *opening their minds* to the scriptures about a Savior who is Christ the Lord.

From the Director of Music

For more than a year, The Village Chapel, along with many other churches in the world, has modified its worship practices in ways never considered after being faced with a global pandemic. Beginning this spring, we will begin reimplementing certain practices that have been omitted from our worship services in an effort to reduce human contact and prevent possible virus transmission. One of the most important and greatly missed elements of our worship services is congregational singing.

After much deliberation and discernment, we are planning to resume congregational singing on Sunday, July 4, at all three worship services. While the vaccination rate continues to be encouraging, allowing a few more months before we resume communal singing will be prudent in continuing our efforts to reduce possible virus transmission. When the decisions were made to modify our worship services upon reopening for in-person worship last July, we knew patience would be required to get through this, and we are asking for just a bit more.

Most of us have never known a worship service without music, specifically singing in a communal or corporate setting, and until last March, it would have been unfathomable to think we might attend church and not sing. Like all of you, I grew up singing great hymns of praise in church. One of the most thrilling aspects of ministry is leading a congregation heartily in song. I look forward to hearing your voices raised in praise of Almighty God on July 4.

Steinway Piano Arrives

Recently, The Village Chapel graciously accepted the donation of a Steinway M studio grand piano from Chapel member Grace Kocher. Grace's late husband David was a devoted and long -standing member of our Chapel Choir, and proud owner of the donated Steinway. The Chapel is also blessed to have two Yamaha C7 grand pianos. On the same day the Steinway arrived, the sanctuary Yamaha was taken to Ruggero Piano Service in Raleigh for extensive refurbishment. The refurbishment process will include a complete restringing with new agraffes, new hammers, shanks, and flanges, replacement of keytops, and a regulating of the action.

The sanctuary piano has served our Chapel well for 30 years and this work will give it new life upon its return. It is also fitting that the legacy of long-time choir member David Kocher be marked with this generous gift. Until the Yamaha returns, the Steinway will be housed in the sanctuary and used in our worship services. When the Yamaha returns, the Steinway will be housed in the choir room, and the existing Yamaha in the choir room will be moved to Chapel Hall.

Construction work began on Monday, April 26. Now we can watch as the boards and bricks begin to shape our Heritage Hall.




















National Day of Prayer Service






Jonathan Stansel will play Lacrosse at Queens University in Charlotte N.C.
