What is the “unpardonable sin?”

that *Webster’s Dictionary* lists: 1) the act of insulting or showing contempt or lack of reverence for God 2) the act of claiming the attributes of a deity for a mere man (Jesus was accused of blasphemy by the Pharisees) 3) irreverence toward something considered sacred (this definition is probably why people think they have committed this sin)

According to Jesus, the unpardonable or unforgivable sin is unique. It is the one iniquity that will never be forgiven (“never” is the meaning of “either in this age or in the age to come” in Matthew 12:32). The unforgivable sin is blasphemy (“defiant irreverence”) of the Holy Spirit in the context of the Spirit’s work in the world through Christ. In other words, the particular case of blasphemy seen in Matthew 12 and Mark 3 is unique. The guilty party, a group of Pharisees, had witnessed irrefutable evidence that Jesus was working miracles in the power of the Holy Spirit, yet they claimed that He was possessed by the prince of demons, Beelzebub (Matthew 12:24; Mark 3:30).

Some interpret these passages to suggest that the Jewish leaders committed the unpardonable sin by accusing Jesus Christ of being demon-possessed, and they had no excuse for such an action. They were not speaking out of ignorance or misunderstanding. The Pharisees knew that Jesus was the Messiah sent by God to save Israel. They knew the prophecies were being fulfilled. They saw Jesus’ wonderful works, and they heard His clear presentation of truth. Yet they deliberately chose to deny the truth and slander the Holy Spirit. Standing before the Light of the World, bathed in His glory, they defiantly closed their eyes and became willfully blind. Jesus pronounced that sin to be unforgivable.

If one ascribes to this interpretation, then blasphemy against the Holy Spirit, specif-

ic as it was to the Pharisees’ situation, cannot be duplicated today. Jesus Christ is not on earth, and no one can personally see Jesus perform a miracle and then attribute that power to Satan instead of the Spirit. Again, one interpretation.

Most understand the application of this passage today as, the only unpardonable sin today is that of continued unbelief. There is no pardon for a person who dies in his rejection of Christ. The Holy Spirit is at work in the world, convicting the unsaved of sin, righteousness, and judgment (John 16:8). If a person resists that conviction and remains unrepentant, then he is choosing hell over heaven. “Without faith it is impossible to please God” (Hebrews 11:6), and the object of faith is Jesus (Acts 16:31). There is no forgiveness for someone who dies without faith in Christ.

God has provided for our salvation in His Son (John 3:16). Forgiveness is found exclusively in Jesus (John 14:6). To reject the only Savior is to be left with no means of salvation; to reject the only pardon is, obviously, unpardonable.

Again, some people fear they have committed some sin that God cannot or will not forgive, and they feel there is no hope for them, no matter what they do. Satan would like nothing more than to keep people laboring under that misconception. God gives encouragement to the sinner who is convicted of his sin: “Come near (Continued on page 13)

Through the years, I have heard different definitions of the *infamous* unpardonable or unforgivable sin. What could one possibly do that Jesus would be unwilling, or even unable, to forgive? I have heard everything from taking the Lord’s name in vain, parking in the pastor’s parking space (just kidding), to the heart-wrenching act of committing suicide (not kidding).

Some have lived in fear thinking they have committed the unforgivable sin, by something they said or did, leaving them hopeless and living life under tremendous condemnation. In twenty-five years of ministry, I personally counseled a few people who felt this way.

A few people are way too many.

The most biblically connected definition of the unpardonable sin is described as “blasphemy of the Holy Spirit,” as it is described in the Gospel of Mark 3:22-30. It’s also recorded in Matthew 12:22-32. Jesus said, “Truly I tell you, people can be forgiven all their sins and every slander they utter, but whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit will never be forgiven; they are guilty of an eternal sin.” (NIV)

Yikes! That’s pretty scary to read. So, what is “blasphemy against the Holy Spirit?” There are three definitions

“Easy Steps Towards Understanding The Bible”

If I were to ask you what the Old Testament is, what would your response be? I was asked this question my first semester of Seminary, and my response was, “History!” If I had to guess, many of you would answer the same way. In fact if I asked you what the Bible is, some would still respond with the same answer. Rolf Rendtorff, a German the-

ologian, (who also happened to be the professor of my professor) once famously said, “The Old Testament is Theology.” While his area of study was the Old Testament, I believe he would have equally said that the Bible in its entirety is Theology. What he meant by this is that the Bible was written to teach us about God. Every word, every verse, every chapter and book exist to show us something about the nature of God. If that is true, and I believe with my whole heart that it is, then we should make it a practice to study well in order to learn more about our God. Below I offer you four possible steps to help you study the Bible well.

I. Choose a Book

There is an idea when studying anything that context is king, and it certainly applies when studying the Bible. Most theologians will never be definitively sure about who wrote certain books or when they were composed, so that context is subjective at best. But what can be known for sure is the local context found in every book. Each book (and I would include Psalms and Proverbs) was written with an intentional purpose and a certain “flow” can be found within each book. There is intentional structure, clear starting and stopping points, and this context helps shed light on the material from beginning to end.

II. Avoid Commentaries

Many people when beginning to study a certain book will immediately turn to commentaries, or at the least they editorial commentary in a study bible. While there is nothing wrong with doing this, my suggestion is to avoid referencing commentaries as long as possible. Some commentaries can be very helpful, and unfortunately some of them are not worth the paper they are printed on. Commentaries are written by individuals who have chosen to go through the process of Biblical discovery (hopefully) and are writing their thoughts on the subject. Sometimes there is a clear agenda, sometimes there are beautiful insights, but by prolonging turning to commentaries one can better understand the subject and better interact with differing opinions.

III. Ask the question, “Why is this here?”

There is a very interesting passage found in the Gospel of John 21:25, where John states that Jesus did many other things, but he


could not have written them all. In fact, the entire world could not contain all the books that could have been written. It shows that John included very specific things, nothing is written in his Gospel by accident. He was guided by the Holy Spirit to tell a specific story, so the reader should always ask, “Why is this here?” This is true though out the entire Bible, not just the Gospel of John. Each writer had a purpose and intention behind what was included. Take for instance the beginning chapters of Genesis. No matter what your view, from creation until the time of Noah there were around 2,000 years of biblical history, yet we only have five chapters. So of those roughly 2,000 years, why do we have the stories that we have? What is the writer trying to tell us? Why is this here?

IV. Study Words

With free tools such as Blue Letter Bible found online, our ability to



study ancient languages has become increasingly easy. Every word has a certain semantic range, or a range that each word can be translated given certain situations, and these meanings can greatly influence interpretation and understanding. For instance, the word seraph from where we get the plural word Seraphim, means “burning one.” This word is translated two different ways in the Old Testament, the first is as a six-winged angelic being which seemingly seems to be on fire. The second translation is that of a serpent, presumably because when someone got bit by a serpent it burned like fire. Just this understanding opens up multiple layers in the biblical text, one of the more fascinating ideas is when Satan is seen as a serpent in the Garden. His curse after the fall was to crawl on his belly, and if this is understood in a metaphorical sense, then its as if a Seraph lost his wings and was forced to remain on earth. Words have profound meaning throughout the biblical text.

I hope this helps you on your journey as you seek to learn more about God through the Bible. It’s an adventure that never ends as we grow in truth. God bless!




Landen Ashley Smith


