The Village Chapel: History, Vision, and Inter-denominationalism (excerpts from the October 29, 2023 sermon)



unday, October 29, 2023, was a momentous occasion in the life of The Village Chapel – 125 years of Christian witness and worship in this community.

1898 was an interesting year. "It was the best of times; it was the worst of times" (as Charles Dickens so famously put forth in a Tale of Two Cities)

1898 gave rise to the Spanish American War. Hawaii, Guam, and Puerto Rico became part of the United States.

Colonel Teddy Roosevelt and his Rough Riders were all the rage, as they posed for the famous picture at the Battle of San Juan (July of 1898).

The Jews of Kiev (now the capital of Ukraine), were expelled from that country in 1898...

And although, it had been some 30 years after the Civil War, the South was still licking her wounds. And when many thought progress was finally being made, the massacre and displacement of African Americans in Wilmington, N.C., took the rest of the civilized community by surprise. That was certainly the worst of times!

The best of times had more to do with new technologies and advancement of industrialization. 1898 was the first time a telephone message was sent from a submerged submarine. 1898 gave birth to the diesel engine, the Good Year tire company. Being from New Bern, I would be remiss if I didn't mention, one of the most nutritious and mind-altering beverages that was ever created was made that year – Pepsi-Cola! The original contents of which are now illegal and rightfully so. There was a reason it pepped you up, and as our competitor would later say "Have a Coke and ... a smile!"

Interestingly enough, it was the soda fountain machine that James Tufts patented 1863 – he didn't invent it – that sold more than all of his competitors combined. It was called the Artic Soda Apparatus. It was colossal! The size of a large pipe organ! The fortune that was amassed was the seed money for purchase of the land that we reside today. Who would have thought that soda, or pop as they say in Boston, would have been so instrumental in our story?

And then finally, it was in 1898 that the first interdenominational worship service ever took place, and it's still taking place today...125 years later. That first service was in the Holly Inn. Then our founding members worshipped in the Casino building. Then they worshipped in The Village Hall, diagonal from The Holly Inn.

Eventually in 1908, The Pinehurst Religious Association (as we were called then) purchased the Village Hall and modified it to become a place of worship. An altar was erected, a bell tower was raised, and that bell now sits in the Hemi (Helen)Tufts Memorial Prayer Garden.

The Village Hall was the location of the First Village Chapel, from 1908 until March 1, 1925 when the first service in this Sanctuary took place. In less than two years we will celebrate 100 years in this Sanctuary.

Little trivia for you, in case you are even on Jeopardy and the category is "The Village Chapel." When the cornerstone was laid at the southeast corner (we actually have a picture of that service on display), they put under the cornerstone: 3 newspapers of the day; 4 score cards for courses 1-4; a prayer book (couldn't have been the 1928 prayer book, the one we use in our Eucharist service. It was probably 1892 Prayer Book); they put a Holy Bible (so we are literally founded upon the Word of God); and in keeping with the spirit of Pinehurst as the birthplace of American golf, they put the current minister's best score on No. 2... which was a 74. You might find this hard to believe, but I also shot at 74 on No. 2, but that score changed when I started the back 9!

Now if you were worshipping in The Village Chapel from 1908 to 1925, you would have seen written in Latin "Pro Deo et Patria" For God and Country. Love of our country has always been a part of our Spiritual DNA. We have no problem, having an American flag in our place of worship, and it's quite natural for us, to this day, to have a Memorial Day and Veterans Day Presentation.

Let's talk about Vision for a moment. The earliest Vision was one of Unity – Christian Unity, not to be confused with the Unitarian Church, which means something else.

Christian Unity, in our historical sense, was that Christians from different Christian denominations, could come together as one. (Continued on Page 14)

# "My Hygge"

enmark is consistently in the top ten happiest countries in the world. This really is a feat considering the weather in Denmark can be terrible. But the Danish have a secret to success, and it is more than just amaz-

ing pastries.

They have a philosophy of living called "hygge." This sounds very similar to our English word for hug, and in many ways a hug conveys the meaning. Think for a moment about peacefully sitting next to a fire on a cold winter day, enjoying a glass of wine or a cup of hot chocolate, while wearing your favorite sweater. That is the epitome of hygge.

But it also runs much deeper than that. Hygge is self-care, it is reflection, it is relationships. It is turning off the television, ignoring the impulse to multi-task or work constantly, and live in the moment. In many ways this runs counter-intuitive for Americans where there is a drive to stay connective to e-mail, social media, and to always be working and never truly rest. Hygge teaches us to focus on the beauty and wonder of life and relationships. I have said this several ways throughout my ministry, but I


have never spoken with anyone at the close of their life who wished they had worked more or responded to more emails.

Hygge also has a very practical spiritual dimension, as again in America we can easily lose the feeling of being embraced by the love and grace of our Heavenly Father. When I think of a spiritual sweater that one can slip on, I think of meditating on the love that God has for me in this moment. In spite of being flawed, and chasing after things of this world, and not living the life I know I should...I can put that sweater on, and curl up next to the fire. And the love of God consumes me with a sense of awe, that the father loves and waits with open arms for the prodigal. This is my hygge.

### The Foundation

ne of the many ways in which The Village Chapel has been blessed is The Village Chapel Foundation. Some members and friends of the Chapel may not know about the Foundation, so the purpose of this article is to raise the level of awareness about the Foundation, what it is, its history, how it's used. etc.

What is The Village Chapel Foundation?

The Village Chapel Foundation is a foundation and legal entity which has consolidated monetary gifts by Village Chapel members and friends over many years. The value of the Foundation today is more than \$3 million. Distributions from the Foundation support many of the ministries and expenses of the church, in accordance with the wishes expressed by the original donors.

#### History of the Foundation

Going back to the 1950's, generous members of The Village Chapel gave money to the church in a way that would support various ministries of the church over a long period of time, even in perpetuity. In some cases, the contributions were made as part of the members' estate plans and in other cases, contributions were made while the donors were living. For many years, individual funds created by these contributions existed separately and were managed by the Board of Trustees, keeping in mind the wishes expressed by the donors. In 1994, as the total value of these contributions grew, a decision was made to consolidate them into a new foundation, The Village Chapel Foundation. Each of the funds is identified separately within the Foundation, named after the donor or the expressed purpose of the fund.

### How is The Foundation organized and managed?

When the Foundation was created in 1994, a set of bylaws was written, separate from the bylaws of The Village Chapel. The Foundation Bylaws establish two organizational structures to manage the Foundation, The Foundation Board of Trustees and The Foundation Committee.

The Foundation Committee is responsible for day-to-day administration of the Foundation. (Continued on Page 11) (Foundation Continued) The Senior Pastor (Pastor Ashley) and The Village Chapel Treasurer (Kay Goulet) are permanent members of the committee. The com-

mittee can have as many as nine members, all of whom must be members of The Village Chapel. Current additional members are John Rowerdink, Foundation President, Kay Beran, Secretary, Mike Elliott, Jeff Holm and Jackie Woodward. The Foundation Board of Trustees are the members of The Village Chapel Board of Trustees plus the Foundation President. They have ultimate responsibility for the Foundation.

The Foundation investments are actively managed by a professional money manager. For many years, this has been The Trust Company of the South. The Foundation Committee and the Foundation Board work with the Trust Company as needed to manage the investments.

#### How are Foundation funds used by the church?

Some of the funds in the Foundation are designated by the donors for specific purposes. For example, payment of staff salaries, property maintenance, welfare, missions and outreach, Christian education, maintenance of the grounds, music, etc. Other funds in the Foundation are undesignated and can be used at the discretion of the Foundation Board.

Over the years, distributions from the Foundation have been used to supplement the church budget if needed, keeping in mind the donors' preferences. This has been a real blessing during periods of fiscal constraints. The overall objective followed by the Board and the Committee over the years has been to use the funds as intended by the donors, while at the same time, being prudent to ensure that the Foundation grows over time to protect its long-term viability. During the ten-year period of 2012 – 2021, the Foundation funded various ministries and programs of the Chapel totaling \$1.3 million, yet during the same period, the Foundation balance increased by \$1.1 million. This record of prudent management ensures that the funds are used as intended by the donors, while at the same time, protecting and growing the Foundation for future years. In this way, contributions to the Foundation can support the Chapel for many, many years, as it has done for more than sixty years already.

Recently, as funds were being raised for the construction of Heritage Hall, the Foundation contributed \$100,000 towards the project. The purpose of Heritage Hall is to provide classrooms for our Sunday School program and one of the funds within the Foundation, the Killian Fund, was designated expressly for that purpose. Contributions to that fund were made over a number of years and Heritage Hall now stands, in part, as a wonderful legacy to Mr. Killian's generosity and that of all the others who contributed to the construction of Heritage Hall.

This past year, the new Village Chapel Scholarship Program was created to provide financial assistance to children and families of The Village Chapel who are pursuing higher education. A new fund has been set aside within the Foundation to provide ongoing funding for this new program. The initial goal is to award up to two scholarships each year, up to \$5,000 each, to Village Chapel youth. The first new scholarships were awarded in 2023 and we are now preparing to seek applications for 2024. The criterium for awarding new scholarships is designed to encourage participation in the youth programs of The Village Chapel. Our hope is that this program can be expanded over time, as funds allow.

#### How can you contribute to The Village Chapel Foundation?

Many of the funds currently included in the Village Chapel Foundation were contributed as part of members' wills or estate planning. This provides a convenient way to contribute to the Foundation after you no longer need the funds. If you would like to do this, the Foundation Committee would like to be informed of your plans. This is not required but is helpful for planning purposes. A brochure has been developed to provide more information and is available through the church office.

Of course, gifts can also be made to the Foundation while you are living. This can be done in the same way you currently contribute to the church. Some members prefer to make contributions directly from their Individual Retirement Accounts (IRA), which can provide a tax advantage.

(Continued from Front Page) The Unity was, that although there are many differences in doctrine, in ritual, and in polity, we were unified in Christ.

One might have different understandings of eschatology, or end time events (The Second Coming and so forth), and some might baptize by immersion, and some with sprinkling or pouring, or that one denomination may be governed by a Bishop or a Presbytery, or a congregational structure...the one thing that they all had in Common was Jesus! They were all Christians no matter their denominational label.

There is an old maxim that some attribute to St. Augustine, but no one is really sure; it goes like this: In the essentials, Unity, in the non-essentials, liberty, and in all things, Charity. That has been the heart's cry of the thousands of people who have worshipped here. We are unified in the essentials of our faith, [Virgin birth, the death, burial and resurrection of Christ] Basically what is captured in the Apostle's Creed and Nicene Creed (the non-negotiables if you will)

When it comes to the non-essentials of ritual, baptism, and governance, then there is freedom to think differently, to differ in praxis. But no matter what, there is always Charity. In all things there is love... Love for God, love for one another, and love for neighbor. That was the Vision of the founders of the Village Chapel. Guess

what? It's still the Vision of The Village Chapel, and it will always be the Vision of The Village Chapel.

And now a word about interdenominationalism as I close. I found the perfect scripture to capture what I think it means to be inter-denominational. I think this can forever be our paradigm passage: (1 Corinthians 9)

19 For though I am free from all, I have made myself a servant to all, that I might win more of them. 20 To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews. To those under the law I became as one under the law (though not being myself under the law) that I might win those under the law. 21 To those outside the law I became as one outside the law (not being outside the law of God but under the law of Christ) that I might win those outside the law. 22 To the weak I became weak, that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all people, that by all means I might save some.

Are we Baptist? Sure. Are we Methodist? Yes. Are with Presbyterian? Absolutely. Can I be fully immersed? Be glad to. We have a baptismal tank! Sprinkled? Oh yes! If it means that you can worship the Holy Trinity, then the answer is always, "Yes."

We are so interdenominational, that we have 3 different services, that for the most part, represent the many denominations that make up our membership. There is a

reason why your pastors, where albs, cinctures, and pectoral crosses in one service, blazers in the next, to pulpit robes, with a crucifer and choral procession. It's because we will be all things, to all people, that by all means Jesus might save some! This is interdenominationalism! We want to see souls saved. We want to see lives changed. We live to introduce people to Jesus. It's about the story of Salvation then and now. For Paul, for our founders, and for us today.

My story, your story, our story, being intertwined with their, and into the best story ever told, the Story of Salvation. Our past is the foundation, the anchor for our future. It will require keeping the non-negotiables as non-negotiable...No capitulation when it comes to the essentials. We can't. We mustn't. We shall not.

Jesus is counting on us to stand fast in our faith, to keep exalting Him each Sunday, and to lift Him up, that He will draw all people to Himself.

Today we celebrate! Today we give God the Glory for this community of faith we call the Village Chapel! We thank Him for 125 years, and we believe for 125 more! To God be the Glory, Great things He has done! And all of God's people said, AMEN!
