

A Word About Membership

Although the current concept of joining a church is quite

different from the New Testament model, becoming a member of The Village Chapel is an important step in experiencing Christian fellowship and community.

In the New Testament, membership was mainly understood by becoming a member in The Body of Christ, by Grace through faith — then later after a period of catechesis — with a public baptism by water. The first creed — The Apostle's Creed — was initially used as a profession of faith during the baptismal ritual. Today, the denominational understanding of church membership is understood as a record system, especially when there are thousands of churches within a particular denomination. The information is used to track growth or decline trends, yearly and decadal.

As an independent, interdenominational church, we recognize dual membership – the ability for our members to be members of The

Village Chapel and another church. We have found that some members want to keep their names on the membership roster of their hometown church, or a church that has longstanding, deep ties with their extended family.

We also have a category of regular worshippers we call, "Friends of The Chapel." This beloved group is highly supportive of our Chapel, in their attendance, giving, and active service. Of course, we would love to have them as members, but we respect their decision to remain friends.

With an upcoming Associate Pastor vote, this week is a good opportunity to prayerfully consider joining. The benefit of membership is having a voice in major decisions that face the Chapel, that directly affect all who worship. If you are unsure about your membership status, please call the Chapel office and we can verify your status. Meet the Congregation

Music Notes

very so often it can be worthwhile to share what goes into the musical planning of a worship service. While there are many determining factors in planning a Sunday service, the lectionary and liturgical season are the most important. For those unfamiliar, the lectionary is a prescribed set of readings for each Sunday in the church year. The lectionary is made up of a threeyear cycle, years A, B, and C. The liturgical year begins with the first Sunday in Advent and ending with Christ the King. We are currently in the second half of year C. The liturgical seasons, be it Lent, Advent, the seasons of Christmas or Epiphany, Eastertide,



or the season after Pentecost will always help to drive service planning.

There are then three areas of focus: choral anthems, organ/instrumental voluntaries, and congregational hymns. Choral anthems are always planned the farthest in advance, with organ repertoire and hymn planning next. While the Chapel Choir is blessed with a well-rounded library, the repertoire is ripe with fresh, exciting choral arrangements by new composers, so additions to the library are always being made. Our choral library consists of anthems based on biblical texts, arrangements of favorite hymns, poetry, and oratorios.

Regarding organ voluntaries, once again, the liturgical season or holy occasion usually guides the planning. A selection based on a particular hymn tune might be included because the lectionary suggests it, even if the hymn is not sung in worship the same Sunday. And of course, there is a great deal of organ repertoire to call on that is highly appropriate for sacred use.

Finally, congregational hymns. The demographic of The Village Chapel makes hymn selection a unique and enjoyable challenge. After the weekly lessons have been studied and hymn resources consulted, factors such as familiarity and regularity are considered, as well as overall singability, especially for an unfamiliar text/tune. As most will note, I am not shy about introducing less-familiar hymns if I feel the message or poetry has the potential to deepen one's worship experience.

Something so valuable about our character as an interdenominational church has always been our congregation's vast knowledge and experience of hymns and worship traditions. We come from different traditions



that sing both similar and different hymns. Our current hymnal, Worship and Rejoice published by Hope Publishing, is meant for use in faith communities such as ours and includes over 700 texts and tunes from German chorales of the 1700s to contemporary hymns and choruses. If we all combined our forces to create a hymnal, the final product would consist of many volumes of hymns. I have found great value in combining our knowledge and traditions and hope you will as well.

In The Village Chapel's recorded history, many of our vibrant ministries have been born out of the efforts of lay leaders, and they remain vibrant because of the continued efforts of lay leaders.

They were warmly welcomed and found themselves impressed with the pastoral staff and immediately became active in Chapel activities. Roy joined the rotation of lay readers at the 11:00am worship service, duties he continued to fulfill until his recent "retirement". Roy has blessed our Chapel with captivating offerings of scripture on Sunday mornings for many years.

Remembering Alex Del Bueno

arning the respect of others is one of life's great accomplishments. Keeping that respect is one of life's treasures. The challenge lies in earning everyone's respect. Alex Del Bueno earned everyone's respect. While Alex has gone to his eternal rest, we continue to celebrate his legacy here at The Village Chapel.

Alex was a great lover of reading, studying history, writing (including poems for his dear Sybil), and music. Musical highlights for Alex included live performances by Louis Armstrong and Benny Goodman, and a young and then-unknown Barbara Streisand.

Even after retiring to Pinehurst following an illustrious career

with Johnson and Johnson, Alex refused to rest on his laurels. His community work in Pinehurst included membership and leadership roles with civic groups and charitable organizations, including Board of Trustees of the Sandhills Community College Foundation. This community work was preceded by years of similar service while he was an executive. He even managed to find time for a few games of golf.

During the last decade, Alex was able to complete his memoir, *La Buona Vita*, in which he beautifully illustrates his life and career, effuses pride in his three children, Lois, Christine, and Michael, fondly remembers his marriage to Susan and later his good times with wife Sybil.



He also offers a poignant account of his involvement in Exercise Desert Rock V, an air explosion of the atomic bomb. We are working to have copies of his book reprinted for those interested.

Marriage to Sybil brought Alex to The Village Chapel 15 years ago. His service to The Chapel included stints on the Finance and HR committees and serving as treasurer. Alex writes in his memoir that these volunteer opportunities provided him the chance to return the favor for the blessings bestowed upon him from God above. Alex's final gift to The Chapel was the vision and oversight for the creation of a scholarship endowed by The Chapel's Foundation.

Alex was viewed as a mentor

even by his peers and will be remembered for his calming presence and singular sense of humor by those who worked with him and knew him closely. Chapel member John Rowerdink remarked at Alex's memorial service that a crisis always managed to bring out the best in Alex, whether in matters of Chapel business or his own failing health. Even in times of disagreement, Alex held the respect of all who worked with him.

In his eyes, Alex Del Bueno lived the good life, and how lucky we were to have been included. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

The vibrancy that defines The Village Chapel's congregation is readily observed through the work of our numerous committees.

These bodies reflect the diverse professional and spiritual backgrounds of their members. In coming editions, the Herald will describe the role played by each of our 16 committees and how achieving their objectives contributes to the Chapel's broader community outreach and enriches the congregation.

The Village Chapel Men's Ministry

The Men of the Chapel is a brotherhood promoting the love of Jesus Christ, providing fellowship opportunities, service to the Chapel and greater Community, while bringing joy to families. The Village Chapel Men's Ministry exists to support the Mission of The Village Chapel, that is our mission! To accomplish the mission of the Chapel we focus on four goals:

- I. To increase the Men's Ministry membership from The Village Chapel Congregation.
- II. To "Pass the Baton" for Men's Ministry Leadership Positions to younger men in the Congregation.
- III. To Emphasize "Family Participation" when planning Men's Ministry activities.
- IV. To encourage Members of the Men's Ministry to set an example for all Congregation Members by attending as many Village Chapel Functions as possible.

Active Men's Ministry Activities

Community Men's Bible Study: occurs on Thursday afternoons from 4-5PM in the Care Cottage during the Fall, Spring, and early Summer. It is during these sessions that men from various religious backgrounds gather to share their insights of God's word. *Men's Ministry Assistance Teams:* Assists as required congregation widows and the families of deployed military personnel with home emergencies *Annual Community Men's retreat:* is a half day event that occurs in the Fall on a Saturday. This year's event is on Saturday, Nov. 19th, from 08:30-12:30 at Pinehurst #9 Ballroom.

Community Service:

- Unaccompanied/homeless youth of Moore County: we work with TambraPlace, Sandhills Student Assistance, and Moore County Social Workers to provide food and clothing to unaccompanied youth. Additionally, "Graduation Guardian Angels" is an annual Spring fund-raising effort that allows the Chapel to present graduating unaccompanied youth, continuing their education, a \$500 gift to fuel their efforts.
- Build-A-Bed: we assist building bunk beds for youth lacking a bed
- Increase Human Trafficking Awareness: work with Friend to Friend, Changing Destinies Ministry, and the N.C. Demand Reduction Task Force to educate the public on Human Trafficking (HT) and thwart HT efforts in Moore County
- We help: First responders, the Academy of Moore County school, and Sandhills Classical Christian School
- We volunteer: Habitat for Humanity: a hard-working organization, supported by hard working volunteers


