The Village Chapel: Celebrating 125 Years of Christian Witness

hat an amazing time in the life of our Chapel. We have a tremendous history and heritage to celebrate this year. I thought it appropriate and in-

teresting to research the good, the bad, and the ugly of 1898. I compiled a list of historical happenings for the 1898, which is the year "the first interdenominational church was held." (Pinehurst Outlook 1914)

It was the first time a telephone message was sent from a submerged submarine (January 6),

USS Maine sinks in Havana harbor, cause unknown, 258 sailors die (January 15)

President McKinley asks for Spanish–American War declaration (April 11)

China leases Hong Kong's new territories to the United Kingdom for 99 years (June 9) I actually remember watching the news in 1997 when the lease ended.

US Marines land in Cuba during the Spanish–American War (June 10)

1st US Marines (600) land at Guantanamo, Cuba during the Spanish–American War (June 11)

US House of Representatives passes resolution to annex Hawaii (June 15)

US captures Guam from Spain during the Spanish—American War (June 21)

US flag hoisted over Wake Island (Spanish–American War) (July 4)

US Senate agrees to annex Hawaii (July 6)

Spaniards surrender to US forces at Santiago de Cuba (July 17)

1st US troops land & occupy Puerto Rico (July 25)

Rudolf Diesel of Germany obtains patent #608,845 for his internal combustion engine, later known as the diesel engine (August 9)

Caleb Bradham renames his carbonated soft drink "Pepsi-Cola". (August 28, New Bern NC- my hometown!)

The Goodyear tire company founded (August 29)

Jews are expelled from Kyiv, Ukraine (October 1)

Wilmington, North Carolina Coup D'état: White Supremacists violently overthrow local government, killing and threatening Black leaders. (November 10)

The first interdenominational church service was held in 1898! What is today the Village Chapel!

Although we know the year – 1898 – we don't know the exact date. What we do know, is that 125 years later, The Village Chapel stands as a herald for Christ and a beacon of hope for all people, foreign and domestic, to worship and to be accepted into the Body of Christ. Happy 125th Anniversary to The Village Chapel!

Changing Seasons

Over the last 32 years the book has become a modern classic, as Whitney seeks to inspire Christians to have a sense of discipline about their own spiritual for-


He examines 11 different disciplines ranging from biblical intake to serving, and from fasting to silence and solitude. But perhaps the true beauty of the book is found in the idea of actively pursuing godliness. It should be every Christian's desire to look more like Christ over time. This is the idea behind spiritual formation and is sometimes referred to as sanctification. It is a molding and shaping of one's life and spirit into the image of Christ. A natural question that most followers of the Way of Christ will have is, "How do I actively pursue godliness?" Whitney's answer, and the answer found throughout the history of the Church, is

to discipline yourself unto godliness.

Do we read our bible on a regular basis, not out of a sense of duty or obligation, but because we desire for God to speak us? Do we pray on a regular basis because we want a deeper relationship with the Creator of the universe? Do we serve on a regular basis, not because a church has an opening to be filled but because we want to be a light in the darkness and the hands and feet of Christ? As the leaves begin to change and fall, and as we quickly approach the season of Advent, I would encourage you to evaluate your relationship with Christ and with the world around you. Seek and strive after godliness during this season, not to be considered better or more worthy than others, but to better be a servant to the least of those within our community. God bless you! Update from your Board of Trustees

e hope that you are reading our monthly Board minutes and staying abreast of BOT discussions. Please reach out to any Board member if you have questions.

Since my last update:

- 1) We appointed a Nominating Committee for the year and made revisions to candidate voting that strengthens congregational voting for new Trustees. All candidates approved through the vetting process will be on a ballot with the final 3 new Trustees selected by the congregation. Therefore, this year it will be extremely important for every member to cast our votes. And Thank You to all members who are running for Board positions!
- 2) We updated our approach to Outreach budgeting and approved a formula using 10% of the 3-year average of Pledge and Plate contributions for the years prior to the current year. i.e., 2020-22 for 2024 budget determination. As contributions increase, our Outreach budget increas-

es, while improving the timeliness of the budget process.

- 3) We addressed some questions and concerns about member recognition. We decided to halt the practice of planting Memorial Trees and hanging individual plaques for service. While we appreciate the great many members making significant contributions, we know that their desire is service to God, to not receive personal recognition. Looking ahead, we grew concerned about a proliferation of awards in our buildings and grounds that would be unsustainable. We will therefore focus more on the Volunteer Recognition event to be held annually.
- 4) We are excited about the progress of 125th celebration planning for Sunday October 29th recognizing the anniversary of the founding of our congregation. We hope all will attend the Unity Service and special luncheon following. Volunteer Recognition will take place during First Wednesday Fellowship on November 1st.

- 5) We have been following up on repair needs at the Care Cottage, which have been light, and upgrades within Heritage Hall,
- 6) We are making progress updating procedure and policy documents as well as, church Bylaws.
- 7) The Stewardship Committee is making very good progress on a fall program with an emphasis on information sharing.
- 8) Our new insurance committee has begun their work meeting with our broker to review plans and needs.

We're excited to have Heather back at work and baby Carson doing well. Many thanks to all the volunteers who covered during her absence. The new phone system certainly was a blessing.

MISSION STATEMENT OF YOUR OUTREACH COMMITTEE: "Prayerfully and earnestly distribute budgeted funds of The Village Chapel to vetted entities through rational giving, while encouraging congregational participation with organizations we support."

Human Resources Committee

The Human Resources Committee of The Village Chapel has a very important and integral function in the structure of the church. Here at TVC the committee is chaired by Ann Whitley and is composed of five members. The Board of Trustees (BOT) appoints the chair of this committee. Committee members are responsible for recruiting and staffing of all church positions (that receive compensation), determining the equitability of compensation and benefits, and training and identifying educational opportunities for staff members. In addition, the committee also evaluates employee relations and organizational development.

Recruitment of qualified employees is a major function of the HR Committee. This can be a huge timeconsuming responsibility to identify the best qualified candidate and can require many hours of reading applica-

tions with supporting documentation. Regarding hiring practices, the committee presents information on candidates to the BOT which has the final authority on hiring. The committee must maintain and update a manual of Employee Policies and Procedures. It is the responsibility of the committee to evaluate the rules and regulations pertaining to monetary Christmas gifts to staff members (amount determined by the BOT). The committee must provide area of personnel management as advice and assistance to supervisors and the BOT regarding training and education to enhance employee development.

The committee advises and assists supervisors and the BOT to enhance the development of a productive ext. 109 or via email at ashworkplace atmosphere. The committee will give advice and assistance as needed to employees regarding grievances and working conditions. It works with supervisors and the BOT

regarding voluntary and involuntary terminations to ensure adherence to legal standards and to promote a level of fair treatment. The HR Committee provides advice and assistance to the BOT, pastors, committee chairs and members of the congregation who may have a complaint with an employee of TVC. The HR Committee will provide advice and assistance for and with the chairperson of the BOT regarding any needed.


