Forward to School



"Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is – his good, pleasing, and perfect will." (Romans 12:2)

In these weeks upon us, we're hearing the annual trumpet call "Back to

School" alerting students and their parents to prepare for another nine months. Nine months of what we hope will involve some significant infusion of education, while moving each student one year further on the path to graduation. Regardless of how much learning actually occurs in the classrooms of our country, the opportunity still remains for all the education that happens outside the classroom, in the margins and the fringes of our lives – often when we least expect it. Education is all around us, and can happen anywhere – even in church!

That's why I don't think of learning as a retreat, as in "back to school," but rather an advance against the forces of complacency and apathy that are satisfied with having learned "all we need to know." Education – as part of a Christian worldview – is all about looking forward, with the expectation that God isn't finished with us yet. As long as we are alive, our minds should be willing and available to be transformed by the renewing power of God's Holy Spirit.

When Oliver Wendell Holmes, Jr. – Civil War veteran and long-time US Supreme Court Justice – was just days away from dying in 1935 at the age of 94, he requested someone to come and read to him. On Thursday, August 26, I had my one month follow-up appointment with my otolaryngologist at Duke Medical Center- Raleigh campus. He said my vocal cords are still healing. He wants to do a second less invasive - surgery in his office using a laser to "clean up" the vocal site for maximum voice quality. The surgery is scheduled for

Tuesday, September 14, at 2:00 p.m. It's a 10 minute procedure, and I'll have a 3 to 7 day period of no talking. Then, I'll build my voice with gradual daily speaking - under the guidance of a speech therapist.

As unfortunate as this situation has been, God has given me a deeper appreciation for my ministerial colleagues, and has ignited my desire to serve our Village Chapel family. All things work together for the good of those who love God and are called according to His purpose- (Romans 8:28).

While reading my doctor's notes in my patient portal, my heart smiled when he wrote "prognosis... excellent." It won't be much longer before I'm 100%. Thank you for your prayers, patience, and overall support.

"There's a time to speak, and a time to be..." (Ecclesiastes 3:7)



For a few weeks there was not much visible progress on Heritage Hall. However, the short story is that we are on schedule, on budget and the subcontractors are busy putting up the framing. The slab is finished and cured, the super structure is in place, the three underground water catchment chambers have been installed and all the utility lines have been laid. Each time you visit the Chapel you will see the rapid progress taking place - the building is going up. Praise God! (You can also watch progress on the web page.)

Of course, this progress comes with a price. At the end of each month we must pay invoices from the contractor. Before construction began we had held expenses to about \$200,000. We now have accumulated expenses of \$542,000. Our overall financial situation is still good: We have \$2.1 million cash in the bank and another \$399,390 in unredeemed pledges. In July, we received an unexpected gift of \$100,000 from the Charles Morris Trust so that the sum total of cash gifts and pledges amounts to \$2.99 million, just short of our \$3 million goal. Fortunately, we have so far not had any major change-orders, which often result in cost overruns. Nor have sub-contractors experienced any major supply chain delays.

Fundraising has stalled and we need to revive it. There are still about a half dozen 2020 pledges outstanding amounting to \$17,500. If yours is one of them please redeem your pledge as soon as possible. If your circumstances have changed and you are unable to meet your pledge, please let us know so we can alter our financial outlook accordingly.

The income reflected above came from 160 donations. If you haven't given or pledged your gift to Heritage Hall, please join those Chapel members who have given so generously to support this important project.

Not included in total gifts and pledges is a net \$16,375 from the sale of pavers. Mike Fusselbaugh and his team have done a great job with the paver project. This revenue will go toward meeting the cost of furnishing Heritage Hall. (which is not included in the construction costs). Remember the cut-off date for ordering pavers is October 1.

By now, you will have seen advertising for the **Hall-A-Palooza**, which will take place at the Fair Barn on October 13. Proceeds from that event will also go toward equipping Heritage Hall. So, come! Janet Lowry and Miss Vickie are already busy pricing the furnishings that we need. The entire congregation will receive invitations to the Hall-A-Palooza next week. Detailed information is on the Chapel website and tickets can be purchased on-line.

In sum, we are in a good place but we still have work to do and time is fast a-flying. We will be cutting the ribbon for the opening of Heritage Hall in less than eight months. There is still time and opportunity to become involved in this historic project. Get on board!

All the time We Need To Speak

These words have taken on special meaning for me in recent years. These words, perhaps cliché to many, are more than a simple phrase or motto or creed. For people who stutter, they mean the world.

I recently completed my fourth summer as a staff member for Camp SAY: a summer camp for young people who stutter. The Stuttering Association for the Young (formerly known as Our Time) was founded by Taro Alexander, an actor and a person who stutters. In his founder's message, Taro states:

"I started SAY to reach out to young people who might otherwise never know the reassurance and relief of connecting with another person who stutters. I started SAY to affirm that every voice matters. I started SAY to inspire even the most quiet amongst us to embrace their voices and dreams."

It is not an understatement to say that countless lives have been changed since Taro first had the inspiration to create this sacred space for people who stutter. In the intervening twenty years, young people who stutter have been given the space to create and be themselves without fear of bullying or ridicule. I have had the pleasure of knowing throngs of young people who are intelligent and creative thinkers, as well as skilled artists and athletes. While saying "see ya later" to our Camp SAY family every summer is difficult, I am filled with pride and joy as we send these beautiful souls back to the world – a world they are set to change.

One of the greatest lessons SAY has taught me is how to be an active listener and how to be present for those who trust me with their time and thoughts. As a person who stutters, my life is filled with (mostly) well-meaning people attempting to complete my sentences or finish a thought. I imagine many people experience the same interactions, fluent or not. As a society, we have been conditioned to race through day-to-day conversations and often are so concerned with getting our own thoughts out of our head that we often fail to really listen to those around us. In the case of people who stutter, having your sentences completed or constantly being interrupted means being told indirectly that you are broken, or that you are not enough.

So, let's give each other the space we need. Let's give each other all the time we need to speak. It could change someone's life.

Our dear friend, John Oltesvig, was called home to the Lord on Monday, August 23, 2021. He died peacefully at his home in Carthage with Renee, his beloved wife of 45 years, at his side.

John was a remarkable man, a Renaissance man in many ways. He loved the great outdoors. He loved to travel. He loved his horses at his farm in Carthage. He loved skiing and back packing. In his earlier life, he had been an Eagle Scout and a Scout Master. He loved photography. But most importantly, he loved the Lord and The Village Chapel.

John was a man of great good humor, always full of hope and optimism. He clearly enjoyed ushering at the Chapel and never failed to convey a cheerful greeting to members and visitors alike. He made everyone feel welcome and special.

John's faith in God and his optimism and resilience saw him through many years of serious medical problems. Some years ago he was at death's door and underwent a series of complicated surgeries. His chances of survival were very slim but his faith was extraordinary. He seemed to harbor no doubt that with God's grace he would recover. And he did. It was indeed a miraculous recovery and he gave God the glory without reservation. More recently, he was struck again with serious illness and he faced it the same way. As soon as he was well enough, he began walking and exercising and keeping us all up to date on his progress through Facebook. It seemed another miracle was in the works.

But this time, after another strong battle, John

finally succumbed. Many of us were surprised because we had become accustomed to witnessing his faith and will conquer the disease that ravished him. But we, like him, accept God's will. John's struggle is over and he is at peace with his Lord and Savior. He had lived his life by his own credo "Have fun, be safe, do great things, love God"

John Oltesvig was born in Oakland county Michigan on January 9, 1948. He graduated from Oakland University where he received a Master of Science degree. Highly successful in the automobile industry, John eventually was named Vice President of Navistar International. His love of automobiles stayed with him and he regularly drove his 1931 Model to town.

Pinehurst is a long way from Michigan where John Oltesvig's life began but we feel privileged that God led him here and made it possible for us to share in his estimable life. Though he is gone, his infectious laugh and good humor and his unwaverable faith remain with us. Thanks, John. We are all better for having known you.
